

OREGON TITLE LAW FOR AUTOS IS TOLD

Warnings to car owners that after July 1 all applicants for licenses will be required to make application for a certificate of title as provided under recent state legislation are contained in a letter from Sam Koeze, secretary of state, received by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor, of Lane county.

The following is the communication received here:

"This law has a vital bearing upon motor vehicle licenses to be issued after July 1.

"Forms for convenience of motor vehicle owners in applying for certificates of title are now being prepared by the secretary of state and will be furnished to motor vehicle owners upon request.

"The subject matter of this letter is of great importance to every motor vehicle owner who may desire a motor vehicle license on or after July 1, and you are therefore especially urged to bring to their attention the provisions of the certificate of title law (chapter 229, laws 1925). For the convenience of all motor vehicle owners who have registered their cars prior to this date, or who may register their cars and receive their licenses before July 1, application blanks for applying for certificates of title will be mailed them within the next few weeks.

"The certificate of title law requires that the owner of every motor vehicle, whether or not the car has been registered and licensed before July 1, shall immediately apply for a certificate of title and furnish the secretary of state satisfactory evidence of ownership before such certificate of title can be issued by the secretary of state."

Data for Alfalfa Growers Planned

Blank forms for the preparation of data on alfalfa growing in Lane county are being prepared at the office of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent. Thirty-one experimental tracts, planted this year, are to be carefully checked by the owners and all information recorded in order that a complete report on the success of alfalfa crops in Lane will be available the county agent states.

"The forms have been prepared in order that the growers may put down the information at once as later some essential features may be forgotten," Mr. Fletcher said. The questionnaire contains queries on the date of planting, type of soil, seed variety and a general history of the crop from planting to harvest.

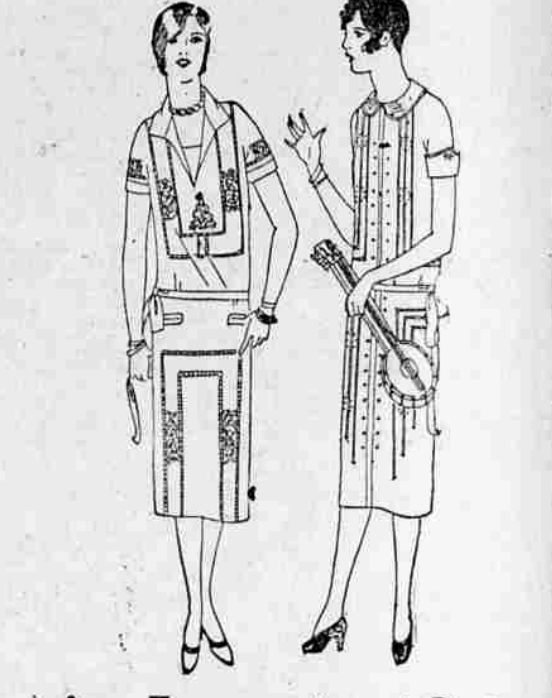
