

SPRINGFIELD MAN HURT IN RUNAWAY

SPRINGFIELD, June 19.—(Special) C. I. Gorie, Jr., was thrown from a runaway and his left leg broken yesterday afternoon when the team of horses hitched to the runaway ran away. Mr. Gorie was trying to drive the team through a gateway at the C. I. Gorie home two and a half miles east of Springfield, when the side of the rake struck a gatepost and the post fell, striking one of the horses and frightening the team. Both horses in Mr. Gorie's leg were broken just above the ankle.

E. W. Gosler had the end of a finger on his left hand accidentally cut off on a corn plough yesterday afternoon while at work. The finger had to be amputated at the first joint.

Bend has Year's First Forest Fire

BEND, Ore., June 19.—The first real forest fire of the season was reported in the Yellow pine near Pringle Falls yesterday. It was quickly put under control, according to the forestry office. The humidity yesterday dropped to 17 which is 13 below the danger point. It was six points lower this morning than at the same time yesterday morning which is considered a dangerous condition by forest officials. A few other minor forest fires have been reported before this season, but were not rated as serious.

Yesterday was the warmest of the season touching 88 during the afternoon while the mercury dropped only to 40 during the night which is a new "high" minimum for this season.

Auto Ownership To be Necessity

SALEM, Ore., June 19.—In a letter sent out by Secretary of State Koeber to sheriffs and other peace officers of the state he states that after July 1, no automobile registration will be granted a motor vehicle license unless the owner shall, at the same time that he applies for a license plate, make application for a certificate of title to his vehicle or show that such application has been made under the 1925 session of the legislature, whereby all motor vehicle owners must file certificates of title with the secretary of state.

Legion Members to Receive Road Maps

One thousand maps of the Central Oregon highway will be distributed at the annual convention of the American Legion of Oregon to be held at Prineville June 25 to 27, according to George Melvin Miller, booster of the highway, who has the co-operation of Eugene post of the legion in the distribution of the maps which also contain information on the highway and the McKenzie pass.
