### 123 JOBS FILLED BY LOCAL OFFICE

Employment conditions in Eugene remained at the peak this week, according to Frank L. Armitage, superintendent of the United States employment bureau, who compiled his weekly report today.

Positions for 123 persons were obtained through the office during the week past, the supply and demand being almost at a balance. Of this number 106 were men and 17 women.

Classification of the positions is as follows: Men: Farm hands, 17; casual workers, 14; common laborers, 31; cooks, 3; dishwashers, 2; sawmill hands, 8; logging camps, 11; millwrights, 2; teamsters, 10; track workers, 8. Total 100. Women: Housework, 10; chambermaids, 3; cooks, 3; waitresses, 1. Total, 17.

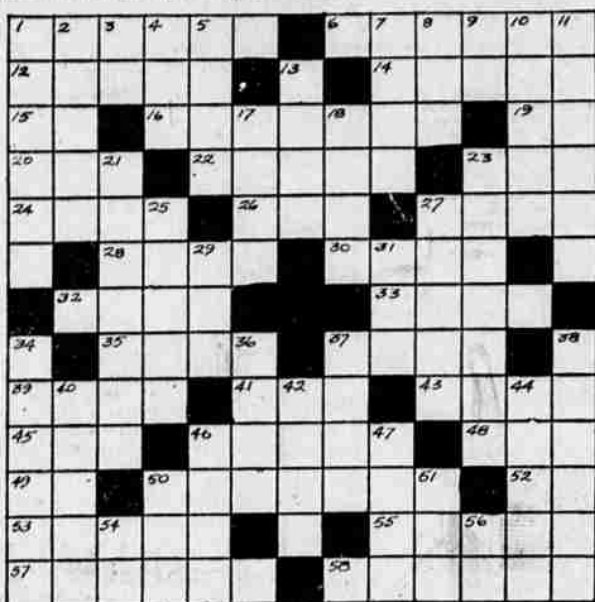

Upon recommendation of Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade forest, the district forester, C. M. Giringer, made the announcement. "No smoking" signs will be posted at all entrance points to the watershed, and on roads and trails, it is stated.

Girls from 8 years to 11 years will swim in the tank in the women's building on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and those from 11 to 15, on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday at the same hour.
