

BUGLE CORPS TO PARADE IN BEND

Eugene's drum and bugle corps, which will compete with other similar American Legion organizations at the big legion convention in Prineville starting Thursday of this week, will parade in Bend on their way to Prineville, it has been decided.

The Willamette valley legionnaires, from Medford, Eugene, Roseburg, Sheridan, Springfield, Corvallis and Salem are routing their trips over the McKenzie pass, and will pass through Eugene Wednesday and Thursday. The buglers will make Bend their first stop in Central Oregon, and will parade in the city in order to "limber up" it is stated.

Bend merchants have appointed a committee to welcome the visitors, and the committee has collected \$50 for entertainment.

Convention at Prineville will be primarily a frontier celebration, with a rodeo each afternoon. Some of the premier riders, fancy ropers, stage coach drivers and buckaroos in the northwest will perform. Eugene is planning to send a delegation of approximately 100 to the convention.

7 BOY SCOUTS TO RECEIVE BADGES

Seven boy scouts will have high honors conferred upon them at tonight's open air meeting of troop 1, according to C. R. Clark, scout executive. Six of these boys will receive badges distinguishing them as "star scouts," and showing that they have passed examinations and received badges for first aid, physical development or athletics, personal health, public health, life saving or pioneer work.

The boys to receive the award are Roy Ford, John Allen, Carl Muller, Robert Allen, Wilbur James and Bradford Larson. The medals will be presented by the Rev. A. H. Saunders, pastor of the First Presbyterian church.

One of the scouts, Robert Allen, has the distinction of being the only scout in Eugene to receive the merit badge of a "life scout." This means he has qualified as a star scout as well as five additional merit badges. The troop celebrating tonight in Troop 1, sponsored two years ago by the Eugene post of the American Legion. The scoutmaster is James Carr.

At the meeting tonight parents of the 25 scouts will be their guests. The program includes entertainment and a few addresses. It will be held at Hendricks park. Refreshments will be served.

BOOTH-KELLY MILL PLANT WILL CLOSE

Logging camps 84 and 35, and the construction camp above Wendling will be closed down from the night of June 28 until the morning of July 13.

BOY IS RESCUED BY MAN AT RIVER PARK

The rescue took place before a big crowd of spectators. The small boy was swimming in deep water, and several times called for help, but no one took notice of his cries, thinking they were in fun.

John Sanders, who was boating nearby, saw the little boy in the water and fail to rise. Mr. Sanders dived from the boat and swam to the spot where the boy sank the last time, bringing him to shore.

First aid treatments were applied to the victim, whose lungs were full of water. After about an hour he responded to the treatments, and regained consciousness. According to the spectators, much credit is due to Mr. Sanders, who ruined a suit of clothes and damaged a watch by the water in his hurry to save the boy.

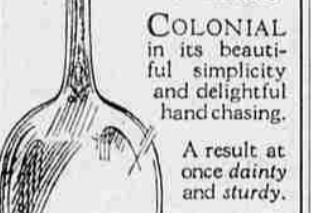
