

### PROPOSED RADIO STATION NOT TO HARM RECEPTION

The proposed radio broadcasting station from the top of the Eugene hotel will not affect reception by local radio sets if they are not of old-time manufacture, states O. V. Humrick, president of the Pacific Northwest Radio Trade Association.

Plans for the radio exposition in Eugene will be discussed by dealers at their next meeting the night of June 29, it is planned. Mahlon Sweet is chairman of the committee planning the program, and at the same time the dates for the exposition will be discussed.

Automobile stickers, bearing the name of the association, and its headquarters in Eugene are to be distributed to auto tourists and radio fans this summer, according to plans.

### COUNCILMEN FAVOR CITY PLAYGROUND

The children of Eugene and Lane county will have a playground in the east park block across from the court house, if action taken by the city council at its meeting last night is matched by the county.

The city engineer was empowered to purchase enough land at the corner of Fifteenth avenue and Fairmount boulevard to do away with the dangerous curve at that place.

Local milk dealers and members of the state board of health appeared before the council to ask that Eugene have a milk inspector, and the council ordered the city attorney to draw up an ordinance to that effect.

Contracts awarded for street paving passed the \$111,000 mark, and ordinance authorizing further street improvement were passed. Steniers were awarded the contract for paving Fifteenth avenue from Moss street, to Fairmount boulevard on their bid of \$15,553.20.

Other contracts let were for the paving of Fairmount boulevard from Moss street to Fifteenth avenue and the paving of Eighth avenue from Monroe street to Van Buren. The Fairmount boulevard project was awarded to McLean and Williams on their bid of \$41,882.75.

George W. Read was given the Eighth avenue job on his bid of \$8,202.45.

The awarding of the contract for the laying of the 22-inch sewer pipe on Thirteenth avenue from Jefferson to Madison streets and on Madison to the alley between Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues was held up by the council until the next meeting which will be held on the regular meeting night.
