OFFICIALS FOR ENFORCEMENT POSTS TALKED
State and Local Politicians Have no Influence in Appointments

DEMAND MADE FOR SHEPHERD DEATH DECREE
State Declares Defendant Guilty of Murdering Foster Son

Preparations Under Way For Demonstrations at Several Cities

New Prohibition Program is Being Made Ready for Action, Report
WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—State and local political influences are to be shored aside in filling new administrative posts in the prohibition enforcement organization, it was indicated today at the treasury, where Assistant Secretary Andrews, was busy on plans for the new regime. It was freely predicted that the assistant secretary would fill many of the 22 divisional administrative posts in continental United States with men from districts other than those in which they will serve.

Indirect Confessions Are Attributed in Talk Before Jurors
CHICAGO, June 24.—(AP)—Indirect confessions he attributed to the defendant were the burden of the jury address today of George E. Gorman, first assistant state's attorney, first speaker in the Shepherd murder trial. In opening yesterday, Gorman demanded the death penalty for William D. Shepherd for the "coldly calculated, brutal murder" of Billy McClintock, his millionaire foster son by administering typhoid germs.

EACH ASSERTS RIGHT TO RULE CITY COUNCILS

A. Ruric Todd Appoints New Set of Officials to Take Government

Thomas Davery Eulogized by Recalled Chief at Mass Meeting

KELSO, Wash., June 24.—Two municipal governments, each asserted rule today over this city of 3,000, where Thomas Davery, editor, was assassinated Friday after a year's factionalism in which A. Ruric Todd was recalled June 3, from the office of mayor.

Todd today, following declarations at a meeting of his followers last night, when he addressed 1,200 in the open air, appointed five men to be councilmen and named others to administrative posts. Meanwhile Nat Smith, installed as mayor after the recall, and councilmen put into office with him, continued to perform.

The men to be named for the council, he says, are: Frank Swager, capitalist; and Charles Carothers, director of the Coquille county bank, for the first ward; A. Penhall, South Kelso grocer, second ward; John E. Johnson, West Kelso, rubberer and E. V. Merriman, West Kelso, realtor, for the third ward; Hollister councilman, who are members of the present council, Jack Hall and W. O. Malloy. Todd regards Hall and Malloy as the only members of the present city council, who hold their offices legally.

Appointments Made
Todd says his appointees for city offices will be: Fred L. Rawson, city engineer; Jack Scott, fire chief; Fuly Ottum, water superintendent; T. H. Himes, police judge; Fred Loney, chief of police; Jack Newton, police sergeant; John A. Davis, street superintendent; Joe Heulre, bridge superintendent; Dr. H. C. Norris, city health officer and Mrs. Lillian Cook, city librarian.

Necessary court procedure to legalize his appointments will be taken, Todd says.

Meanwhile, the Smith administration city council met last evening in the city auditorium and considered local improvement district plans and other general affairs of the city.

Mrs. Scott Passes Away in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24.—Margaret McCloskey Scott, widow of the late Harvey W. Scott, Portland editor, died here today after an illness of four months. Mrs. Scott was born in Lathrop, Pa., August 2, 1859. She was married to Mr. Scott in 1876 and they came to Portland that year. Mr. Scott was editor of the Morning Oregonian until he died in 1910. Mrs. Scott is survived by two sons, Leslie M. Scott, Astoria, B. Scott, and daughter, Mrs. Leroy R. Fields.

Grading Work Rapid

All the grading work on the Natron cut-off will be completed by this fall, reports V. W. Winter of Rajotte and Winter, sub-contracting for grading work on one section of the road, Mr. Winter is in Eugene for a few days transacting business, and says that work is being carried on at top speed at the present time. The Southern Pacific has a 17 million dollar investment in the Natron cut-off, he says, and is rushing the work in order to reduce the heavy interest on the investment. Mr. Winter's company is sub-contracting from McFee Brothers of Seattle, and the two contractors have a monthly payroll of \$150,000. Mr. Winter's firm employs 600 men. The construction on the Natron cut-off is the heaviest piece of railroad construction now being carried on in the United States, according to the contractor.
