

FACULTY RELATION IN PRINCETON TOLD

being done there. The way in which students use the library, and the manner in which they apply themselves to their studies indicate that much constructive work is being done here, Dr. Spaeth declared.

Institution Endowed

Princeton university is an endowed institution, supported in a large part by the alumni, hence the organization of the governing body would differ somewhat from that of a state-owned university. Executive power is vested in a board of partly self-perpetuating, partly elected trustees, recruited from alumni, and from districts of the United States. Alumni representation is very important, stated Dr. Spaeth, and it is his belief that since state institutions are calling more and more on alumni for help, through endowment and gift campaigns, that a demand for representation on governing bodies would be made in the near future.

The board of trustees at Princeton deals with the faculty in almost exactly the same way as requested by the faculty at Oregon during the recent denunciation and dismissal cases. A "conference committee" composed of five members of the faculty and a similar number from the board of trustees, meets before every meeting of the board. Here all matters relating to the faculty, on which a conference is desired, are brought up, discussed, and resolutions passed concerning them. In this way, faculty opinion and desires are definitely understood, and presented for consideration.

Committee Plan Told

The faculty committee is an actual representative body of the entire faculty, and it is appointed by the "committee on committees," a body elected by the faculty. Members serve on the faculty committee for three years, in rotation, and in this way experienced men are always on hand. The board of trustees also presents matters at the conference, through its committee of five, and if the faculty committee feels that the matter should be given deeper consideration, they request that they be allowed to present it to the faculty in regular meeting.

While the action of the conference committee is not binding on the trustees, the faculty has a definite voice, and a full opportunity to present its side of every point for consideration, points out Dr. Spaeth. All discussions are brought to definite conclusions, and recommendations in the form of resolutions, are passed. A course of action is thus outlined for both the faculty and the board of trustees.

Feeling is Better

"The faculty members feel that they are being treated like gentlemen, and that they are receiving every fair consideration," said Dr. Spaeth. "Their consultation and advice is not only received, but asked in the conference meetings. The dignity of the profession, and above all, the liberty that comes when men are unafraid of interference or dictation from others, is thus preserved."

Miss Wave Leslie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Leslie, 1552 Ferry street, who has been teaching at Christian college, Canton, China, is out of the danger zone of the Chinese uprisings, according to cablegrams received by Mr. Leslie this week.

A newspaper report declared that a group of Chinese who had been attacked and shot at by the rebels had sought refuge at Christian college, but information received by the headquarters of the college in New York stated that the report was erroneous. This information was sent to relatives of all Americans at the Christian college.

Mrs. Leslie is at present at Oregon city, where she is a delegate to the Women's Relief corps convention, Mr.

ROADS TO COAST GETTING BETTER

Roads leading from Eugene to Florence and nearby beaches are in good condition, provided motorists know which road to take, says W. J. Kyle, of Florence, Lane county director in the Roosevelt Memorial Coast Highway association.

"Take the road out of Eugene via Elmira to Triangle lake," says Mr. Kyle. "Then drive to Rainrock, watch for the forest road sign, 20 miles to Florence over Mapleton hill (right turn)."

"The Mapleton hill road is good and the trip over the hill can be made in 25 minutes easily. It is then 16 miles to Florence over good roads."

"From Florence to the ocean beach is seven miles, a trip made very easily through sand with balloon tires. This is one of the best beaches on the coast and Eugene people are invited to come and see for themselves."

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Lipton tea Agent Visits in Eugene

M. M. Riddle, representing the Thomas J. Lipton Tea company, is in Eugene and is a guest at the Eugene hotel. Mr. Riddle reports that his company has just installed a coconut machine in their New York plant, costing \$580,000—the largest in the world.

"Thomas J. Lipton now controls the tea, coffee, cocoa and raw rubber market of the world," says Mr. Riddle. "Incidentally, he is starting a yacht to compete in the international cup races next year, and to represent this country. Tea is cleaned and packed, and coffee roasted in San Francisco for Pacific coast distribution. The company will ship 200 carloads of tea the last week of this month from the three factories, located at Hoboken, Chicago and San Francisco."

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
