

HEAD OF STANFORD APPEALS FOR LESS DOGMA IN SCHOOLS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., June 24.—Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford university, addressed the graduating class Tuesday at the thirty-fourth annual commencement.

He said: "To put on such blinders is a favorite way the old have for blinding the young. It is easier to teach a prejudice than to urge fairness. It is easier to beat a drum of squint the blood of a black cat killed in the dark of the moon on a sick man than it is to use the microscope and the test tube in studying him with the result perhaps of changing the water supply for his neighbors to keep them from the same illness. It is easier to pull down the shades to new and disquieting light than to face it unafraid."

"Our eyes are directed backward more than forward in much of educational processes which we use to train men and women for the days ahead. "Our records are crowded with much human experience, and we know a great deal about ourselves and the world. It seems clear that man's body is pretty much that of many centuries ago. While we live longer, have fewer epidemics and less days of illness, no one would seriously claim that Nature would run better than some of the marathalon runners of Greece, or that John I. Sullivan or Jack Dempsey had finer bodies than Sampson or Goliath or some of the gladiators of Rome. There is no evidence that the quality of man's mind has improved in spite of centuries of training. Solomon, Solon, Hippocrates, Leonardo Da Vinci, Pascal, Shakespeare, Lincoln, would be hard for us to match even in these days of hundreds of universities."

Dr. Wilbur added: "The fundamental elements in man's environment have not changed and yet he has so changed his environment that we have a new world. His curiosity, his unquenchable fighting qualities, his cooperative spirit, combined with the use of thought, have given him such success as is his. "Above all, there have always been daring men who could and would not be baffled by the unknown. "The educator asserted that "to meet facts square on without blinders is a sign of education."

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The Anti-Saloon league and the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, whose goals in the prohibition questions are exactly opposite, find themselves in paradoxical agreement on the shake-up in the enforcement system ordered by the Assistant Secretary Andrew of the treasury. Both organizations, however, qualified their endorsement of the new order in statements last night.

The reorganization ordered by Mr. Andrews, to be effective August 1, establishing state lines in favor of division, according to federal judicial districts and administrative authority, was described by the association as a move "obviously in the right direction."

If prohibition can be enforced, the statement declared, "this man and these methods, will enforce it. We are equally confident too, that if the law cannot be enforced, which will be the case, then General Andrews will be just as straight forward in announcing his failure as he has been in his success."

dwell at some length on the supposed murder late Friday night of Thomas Dorey, publisher of the Cowitz County News and Todd supporter. In his talk, which he called "He was my friend," Todd said:

"Thomas Dorey was one of the least selfish men I have known. Fearless in carrying forward what he considered the cause of the common people, he never attempted to conceal facts from friend or enemy, whether or not his presentation of the facts caused men of great power to lack his newspaper. From his pen dripped the spirit of the crusader editor."

Covitz county commissioners have authorized the expenditure of \$5,000 for the investigation of the Dorey death. Of this sum, \$3,000 is to be paid to Luke S. May, Seattle criminologist retained by the county to trace the supposed murderer. The commissioners said they would appropriate another \$5,000 if it is needed.

Before leaving for Seattle on Tuesday, May repeated that no tangible clue to the death mystery had been found. Of first importance in the investigation, he says, is the determination of whether or not the gun and bullet found near the death scene are the ones used in Dorey's slaying.

WOMEN UPHELD AS MODELS OF VIRTUE

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—Notwithstanding kissing and cocktail parties, young women are just as pure nowadays as they were years ago, in the opinion of John W. Ford, a justice of the state supreme court and a backer of the clean books league, which has been active in seeking legislation for suppression of salacious literature.

He expressed his views in court yesterday in ruling that testimony of a wife's breakfasts in negligee with another man and occasional kisses and cocktail parties were not sufficient evidence of infidelity. The dictum was given in the suit of Thomas H. Symington, wealthy railroad equipment manufacturer.

Justice Ford said that many of the things women did nowadays were misconstrued.

Talbot W. Chambers, coal dealer and one of two co-respondents named by Symington was arraigned yesterday on charges of adultery as the result of his testimony concerning Mrs. Symington. He pleaded not guilty.

Counsel for the wife gave notice that she intended to file perjury charges against Symington.

Dr. Edward S. Pope, testified that Mrs. Symington had admitted to him confidentially that she had been unfaithful to her husband.

Six of the 19 charges against Mrs. Symington were withdrawn by the plaintiff. The court indicated that in eleven other charges he would direct the jury to find in favor of the wife. The 11 counts concern relations between Mrs. Symington and Maurice Fatio, an architect.

Evidence was introduced that Fatio had kissed Mrs. Symington and had breakfasted with her in her room.

by Chinese to enter the foreign settlement at Canton would be forcibly resisted, and that the Chinese government would be held responsible for the consequences.

SITUATION IN HAND
LONDON, June 24.—(AP)—Colonial Secretary Amery told the house of commons today that the British government has the Hongkong situation well in hand and is able to preserve law and order there.

Foreign Secretary Chamberlain was asked whether he had evidence that disturbances in China have been fostered or aggravated by agents of another government. He replied affirmatively, but did not specify the government to which he referred.

FOREIGNERS KILLED
CANTON, June 24.—(AP)—Several Europeans were killed and many others wounded today when fighting broke out between Chinese agitators and residents of Shameen, the foreign concession here. Women and children are fleeing on the U. S. S. Ashville, preparing to leave Hongkong tonight. The situation is extremely serious.

AGITATION SPREADS
WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—Spread of the anti-foreign agitation to Amoy, where the situation has assumed graver aspect, was reported to the state department today by Consul Leroy Webber in a message filed June 23. The consular corps had requested naval protection as the Chinese authorities could not guarantee life and property.
