

### FURTHER VIEWS ON STATUS OF WOMEN AND MORALS GIVEN

NEW YORK, June 25.—The bounds of propriety of the modern generation beyond the age of 18 have now been laid out to include cocktail parties, Mrs. Esther Ford Wait, young daughter of Supreme Court Justice John Ford, who is presiding at the trial of Thomas H. Symington, against his wife.

Mrs. Wait believes in prohibition if it can be enforced.

"But as it can't," she said, "I have nothing against a drink or two at cocktail parties or serving cocktails to my friends when they come to dine."

Justice Ford said from the bench at the Symington trial that negligence in the breakfast with another man, hissing and drinking were not in themselves proof of misconduct on the part of Mrs. Symington. He cited his daughter as an example of a nice young woman who goes to cocktail parties.

Mrs. Wait explained that her father always passed up the cocktail party.

"But he holds very sensible views on modern manners," she added. "This generation is not going to the dogs. The present day girl is as wholesome and pure as her predecessors of the striped-in-wool seventies."

"But I am utterly against indiscriminate drinking and pajama parties by young girls. They are too young and impulsive. If I had a daughter in her teens, I would not let her go to parties before she was 16. Until 18 she would have a chaperone. After that I would let her go out alone on a reasonable hour. Young men should be allowed less freedom than girls, for they are more dangerous in girls when gadding around on the loose."

The matter will be referred to the city attorney to look up the legal technicalities relative to granting the position.

Night Officer Fred Hinson of the Springfield police force was granted 10 days' vacation on full pay by the council. Sidewalk and street improvement were discussed, but no definite action was taken.

### RAIL SUIT OPENED

### BUSINESS NEEDS IN CHINA ARE TALKED

SEATTLE, Wash., June 25.—The Chinese business men who in the past are abstained from politics are now beginning to realize they must have "say" in the government. Tse Tsok-ki, manager of the Kwang-Tung Electric Supply company of Canton, China, said, speaking before the National Foreign Trade convention here.

"Furthermore," he added, "the vastness of the people who realize they must have peace."

While civil strife in the past few years has not encouraged much development the Chinese are not depressed Tse said, and pointed out that department stores and banks run on a foreign system, have sprung up all through the important centers of the country.

He declared that though a big part of this progress is due to Chinese turning after study abroad, most of the capital required comes from Chinese in their native land.

Going into the history of China's foreign trade, Tse said that because foreign firms not knowing the language or conditions there, they did business through a middleman, known as a "compradore." He advocated doing away with this system and adopting a method of direct dealing with Chinese business men.

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### CLARENCE DARROW BANQUET TALK OFF

DAYTON, Tenn., June 25.—Withdrawal of an invitation to Clarence Darrow to address the Tennessee Bar association at Memphis Friday because his presence "might be misconstrued," and a statement by Bainbridge Colby expressing surprise at the "holiday atmosphere" surrounding the approaching evolution trial were high lights in an otherwise dull period of preparation for the court battle.

Mr. Darrow, Mr. Colby and other attorneys for the defense of J. T. Scopes, indicted science teacher, have just concluded conferences in Knoxville. Mr. Darrow departed for Chicago and the former secretary of state for New York, while Dudley Field Malone returned to Dayton, stopping off in Chattanooga long enough to give a public statement of his views in trial issues.

Mr. Colby, whose statement was issued in behalf of all members of the defense staff, called "the shocking and abnormal character of the legislation," involved as "one of the most serious questions which could possibly arise to challenge the ability of the citizenship to rational self-government."

Mr. Malone declared he had no difficulty in holding with devotion to Christianity and also to evolution. "I have come to Tennessee to in-

tervene in this case in behalf of young men and young women who are entitled in all public institutions to be taught the truth and the whole truth," he said.

The country is suffering from "good people, who in their ignorance feel ordained to save the rest of us who stand in no need of their ideal salvation," Mr. Malone said.

He added that he "believed an exposure of Mr. Bryan and the psychology of people of that type," would help to clear the air "for straight thinking."

### Staff Cuts Ready For Indian Bureau

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—Two hundred and ninety-four employees in the field service of the Indian bureau, including one or more in nearly every Indian agency and reservation in the country, will lose their jobs July 1 under a sweeping reorganization program announced here today.

The reduction of the force will clip \$227,000 annually from the payroll. Clerks, stenographers, matrons, Indian police, judges and other officials are among those whose positions will be abolished.

The number remaining on the bureau rolls July 1 will be 4,392.

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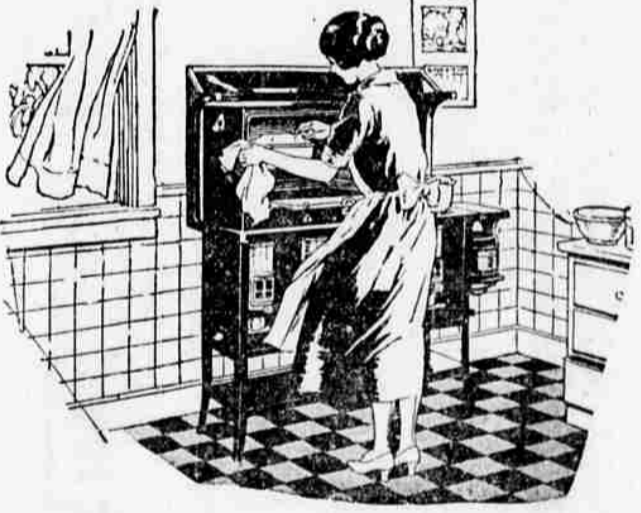


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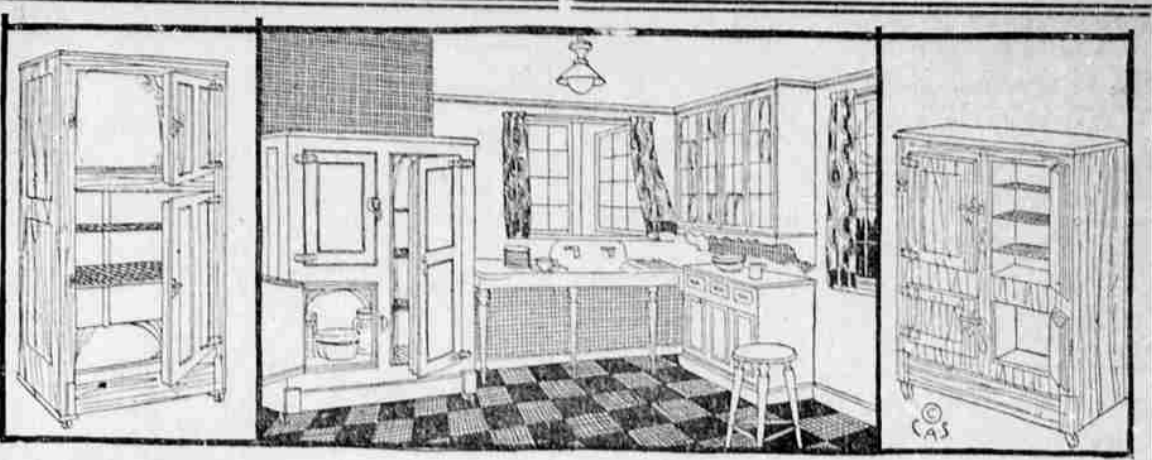
