

CHINESE SITUATION SLIGHTLY BETTER

SHANGHAI, June 25.—(AP)—Dragoon day, observed by Chinese in less troublesome times to mark the season of sprouting seeds, today was commemorated with armed forces patrolling the sweltering streets of Shanghai, which took on a holiday aspect despite the expected flare-up of strike sympathizers.

The Manchurian troops of General Chang Lo-shan, who recently extended to his armed forces to Shanghai, invaded a recreation ground on Chinese territory and broke up a meeting of students and radicals.

The dragon boat festival at which the veterans was expected, passed off without a flare-up from the Chinese side. All volunteer foreign defense units were mustered ready to go down any disturbance, but their services were not needed.

At midnight today, it was expected that the general strike, which has paralyzed Shanghai business for the past month would be terminated tomorrow. The strike will continue to apply to British and Japanese owned mills, however. The status of the shipping strike remained unchanged.

The American Association of China today called to the state department urging cooperation with the United States with other powers in adopting a strong attitude of insistence towards China in the observance of treaty regulations.

The message said the Chinese government had been charged with responsibility for the loss of lives and property.

Defense forces were unrelaxed tonight.

British Note Sets Blame on Chinese

HONGKONG, June 25.—(AP)—The Chinese civil governor of Canton today received a reply to his protest to the British consul-general in which the latter places all responsibility for the deaths of Chinese yesterday while they were parading opposite Shamen, the foreign settlement, upon the Chinese authorities.

In his note the Chinese governor asserts that soldiers and police at the British concession suddenly opened fire with machine guns and rifles after the parade had passed almost entirely up Shamen street. The fire, the Chinese official contends, was directed at the crowds and was participated in by police and soldiers of the French concession, who followed the British lead.

Killing Held Brutal

A Portuguese gumbout fired big guns with the result that the killed and wounded totaled more than 100. The brutal killing was premeditated and secretly planned, the civil governor asserts. When he heard the particulars, the Chinese official said he was exceedingly amazed and in duty bound to enter the most serious protest and he added that the entire responsibility for the affair rested upon the civil and military officials at the French and British concessions and the Portuguese soldiers and gumbouts concerned.

Chinese are Blamed

The British consul general, reply, points out that the Portuguese gumbout took no part in the unfortunate affair. It was the defense forces of the British and French concessions who replied to an attack made by them by Chinese troops or military students on their side of the canal.

"I can, from the evidence of my own eyes make the statement on oath," he says, "that the firing was first started by Chinese. The senior British naval officer and myself were standing in view of the bridge for the special purpose of guarding against any precipitate or nervous action on the part of the defenders and only escaped with our lives out of a hail of bullets directed at us. It was only then that in self defense fire was opened from Shamen and by French forces, which were similarly attacked. The firing from Shamen ceased even before the sailing from the top of hours opposite by Chinese soldiers was discontinued.

"You state that the action taken by the British and French authorities was premeditated. This, I absolutely deny."

The consul general points out that the premeditation was on the part of

yesterday. Only one fire is burning at the present time in the forest. It is located at Cultus mountain and has been burning since Sunday but is neither large nor serious.

Jack Bowman, state fire warden, reports that with hazardous conditions existing there are no fires in his territory at the present time.

FIRE MENACES MILL

SALEM, Ore., June 25.—Camps and equipment of the Willamette Valley Lumber company, northeast of Siletz basin are directly in line with a forest fire in green timber that is burning fiercely and making rapid headway in that direction today, according to a message received from Will Caldwell, in charge of the ranger station on Bald mountain.

The latest outbreak of the fire is a continuation of the fire that burned over a wide area in Siletz basin yesterday. The basin fire is under

control, but has climbed the ridge on west of the basin, and whipped by a southwest wind, is tagging to the northeast. A crew from the Willamette Valley company's camp is fighting the flames under a handicap by building fire trails. It is practically impossible to use backfires, because of exceedingly dry weather makes these dangerous. The fire is doubtless destructive since it is in green timber.

DRY WIND REPORTED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—While a hot, drying wind was sweeping the forest areas of Oregon, hourly increasing the fire hazard, several fires were being fought today in the western part of the state, and one in central Oregon.

A homestead cabin was burned and 30 acres swept by a fire near Mist, Ore., yesterday, the Oregon Fire Relief association reported today. The fire was brought under control.

About 100 acres of old slashings of the Nehalem Timber company near Scappoose, was burned over, it was reported today.

Led by forest service officials, between 120 and 140 men were today fighting a fire which broke out yesterday in timber owned by the Bridal Veil Lumber company and George Joseph, near Palmer, Ore.

Several logging camps in the Cochrane and Kerry district on the lower

Columbia river, closed down today on account of fire danger.

Threatening a great body of timber in the Siletz basin, the fire which yesterday destroyed camp 4 of the Cobble-Mitchell company, at Valsetz was still burning today. The company's entire force of 200 men was fighting the flames. For a time the fire menaced the town of Valsetz and the big mill at that place, but the wind changed and fire came only within a quarter of a mile of the town.

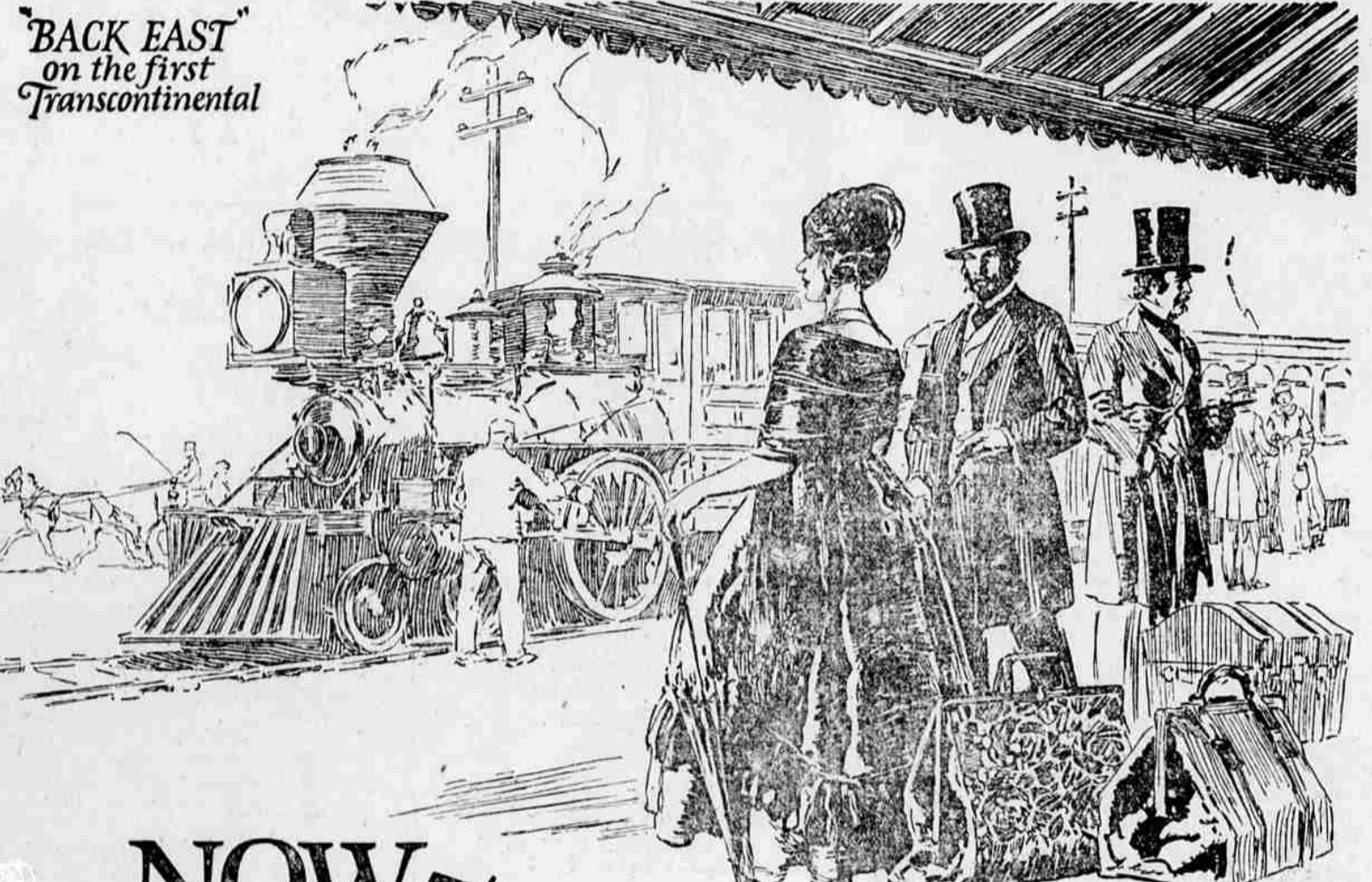
Huge Veteran has Grief With Shoes
