

# CHRISTENING OF CRUISER BUILT HERE IS JULY 4

Launching of the three-quarter raised deck cabin cruiser "June", H-193—the first and only type of sea-craft to be built in Eugene—will take place with appropriate ceremonies at Mapleton Sunday morning.

The cruiser will be taken to Mapleton on Lawrence Couch's large truck, where it will be slid into the Simlaw river. It is a well-built boat and was designed and constructed by Harold Waggoner and Robert Donnelly of the Jensen garage.

The "June" is 27 feet long, 8 feet wide at the beam and is built of galvanized steel. Its power plant is a 35 horsepower gasoline motor, with all controls from the steering deck. Its speed is 10 miles an hour. Cabin accommodations for 10 persons, including a crew of four, having two sets of upper and lower bunks with galleys, accommodations. All lights are electric. Mr. Waggoner, who is a machinist, has designed a serviceable cruiser that is complete in preparation for her trial trip Sunday. The body of the boat is in light gray battleship color, with green water line. Interior finish is of white enamel.

Captain, officers and members of the crew of the cruiser June have arranged to take part in the big Fourth of July celebration at Mapleton, in which special aquatic events will be featured. During the summer the young men will enjoy deep sea sports, as the cruiser has been equipped for outside fishing.

Another motor boat enthusiast of Eugene is Chester Good of the Eugene Reclaimed Auto Parts company. He has just completed a 25 foot speed boat and launched it at Mapleton last Sunday. It is a nifty speed craft with a six-cylinder, 60 horsepower motor. Mr. Good has named it "Skookum the Fifth" as it is his fifth boat. Mariners at Mapleton declare it is the fastest craft at the harbor. "Skookum" and "June" are expected to be the big attractions at Mapleton's July 4 celebration.

# SECRETARIES WILL HAVE MEETINGS ON CAMPUS JULY 5-10

The fifth annual short course for commercial secretaries will be held at the University of Oregon July 5 to 10, it was announced today by E. C. Robbins, dean of the school of business administration. A more comprehensive program, with a new feature, "director's day," has been arranged for the week. J. H. Fuller, of Ashland, president of the State Association of Commercial Secretaries, which with the school of business administration is sponsoring the meetings, will attend for the fifth time, and he is expecting that the enrollment is expected to be heavy.

Instruction in technique of chamber of commerce work will be one of the outstanding features this year. This will be led by F. O. Hagie, managing secretary of the chamber of commerce of Walla Walla, Washington. Mr. Hagie is president of the Washington association of commercial organization secretaries, and has had considerable experience in many lines of secretarial work.

I. E. Vining, president of the state chamber of commerce, will be present to discuss important state problems, as will W. B. O. Dodson, manager, Portland chamber of commerce, and W. G. Ide, secretary of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce.

The regular program this year will follow the form of those of the previous four years, and the usual fire-side discussions and recreational features will be enjoyed.

Many topics of great interest to the state will be taken up. "Oregon's transportation problems," will be discussed as will "State Development and Land Settlement," "Oregon's National Playgrounds," and other subjects.
