

INCORPORATION OF CITY IS PLANNED SOON BY OAKRIDGE

Steps are to be taken at once to incorporate the city of Oakridge, announced Dr. L. W. Peate, president of the chamber of commerce of that city. "Oakridge now has a population of between 600 and 800, not including many residents who are just outside the city limits," says Dr. Peate. "The people feel that the time has come for an organized community, in order that we may all work for a greater city."

The Oakridge chamber of commerce now has a membership of 50 progressive business men, and a membership drive, to be staged soon, is expected to swell the number to 75. A total of nearly 50 businesses are now flourishing in the city, it is pointed out.

The community has been platted, streets named, and a large square set off as a city park. It has all the elements of a regular city, and is expected to take its place with the leading municipalities of Lane county as soon as it is incorporated.

The city also boasts an up-to-date school house and high school, and an attractive church. A fire system, with a well trained volunteer fire crew, has been put into operation, and two stations, with 300 feet of large fire hose in each, established.

Although many of the buildings in the thriving city are of the temporary "mushroom" type, these are rapidly being replaced by substantial, well built structures. The new drug store, with the hotel above, is nearly completed, and is already occupied. The theater, dance hall, new hardware store, and several other buildings are of the permanent type, and are built in an attractive style.

FAST CARD IS READY FOR OAKRIDGE FANS

FEATS PERFORMED BY JEWETT MOTOR

Reports of brilliant feats performed by the Jewett are coming in almost daily now that the hill-climbing season is on, say advices from the Paige factory to H. J. Bringle Motor Co., local Paige and Jewett distributors.

The high point so far this year was reached the other day, according to Paige officials, when a stock Jewett touring was driven from Modesto to the floor of the Yosemite valley sealed in high gear. The feat was accomplished by W. A. Jones, Paige-Jewett dealer in Modesto.

About the same time, it is said, another make of car covered this route and considerable stir was made because only 35 gear changes were required. This car sells for three times the price of a Jewett.

Modesto trade officials checked the Jewett before the start and sealed the differential and transmission gear cases. The car took the most difficult grades and the sharpest turns with ease and always had power to reserve. The seals were again inspected on arrival at Yosemite.

California motor authorities vouch for the statement that this is the first time this trip has been made by any car in high gear.

Two more notable hill-climbing victories are among Jewett's list of recent achievements, the Paige company's president announces. On Decoration Day one of the Jewett applicants that won highest laurels last year showed the best time up a long and difficult hill at Port Jefferson, N. Y. At Rockford, Illinois, June 7, in a contest open to all makes listing at \$2000 or less, a stock Jewett was first.

Full line-ups of all teams will be announced this week, it is stated.

FAT STEERS READY FOR BIG BARBECUE

Huge chunks of beef, done to a turn, will be offered to everybody at Oakridge July 4 and 5, during the big celebration. A monster barbecue, which means death and total extinction to at least two steers, will take place both days, announces Dr. L. W. Peate, president of the "End of Steel" celebration association.

Two steers, weighing a total of 1800 pounds, have already been purchased and are now being fattened for the slaughter, it is stated. A complete force of six of the best cooks in Oakridge has been engaged to take care of the culinary work involved, and they promise the most savory beef that has ever been seen in the upper river country.

"Don't be afraid to come around for all the meat you want," says "Doc," "for if we see that we have more than enough people for two steers, we can get a dozen more here in a hurry."

The barbecue and big feed will take place in the center of the city, at the big city square.

NATRON CUT-OFF TO BE SEEN ON FOURTH

One of the most attractive features of the Oakridge Fourth of July celebration will be the inspection trips which will be run to the scene of operations on the Natron cut-off. Several trains a day, as often as there is a demand for them, will be run up the newly laid track beyond Railroad, and persons interested will be given a chance to inspect the railroad company's work.

Engineers will be on hand to explain all the eccentricities of the construction of this great project, it is announced.

The actual building of the railroad will culminate one of the greatest engineering feats ever seen in the west. On the portion of the project started 15 tunnels are encountered between Oakridge and the summit of the mountains, near Odell lake. Here the greatest bore of all comes, when the road will cut directly under the highest point of the line. This tunnel will be the longest of all, 3300 feet, and will come out on the shore of one of the greatest scenic attractions

in the west, Odell lake. Work is being done from both sides at once on this project, while the others will be included in the contract soon to be let. The maximum elevation reached is nearly one mile, at the big tunnel. The climb from Eugene, which is slightly over 400 feet elevation, is made in about 75 miles.

In the section under contract are 14 tunnels, totaling 10,125 feet, nearly two miles, or almost one-seventh of the 15-mile stretch. This does not include the summit bore.
