

TWO BILLS WIN AT POLLS; VOTE OF 647 IS CAST

Only 647 Eugene citizens turned out to vote at the special election yesterday, with the result that two of the measures passed and one failed because of a tie vote. They were as follows:

Approved— Yes No
 \$25,000 fire apparatus bonds 479 177
 Paving intersections 333 292

Failed—
 Re-assessing costs 316 316

City officials are rejoicing because the fire apparatus, consisting of a triple-combination pumper and a city service truck purchased last fall, will be paid without the trouble of a damage suit. Yesterday was the third time this measure had appeared upon a ballot.

The third ward defeated the re-assessment measure. This ward, although it polled but 123 voters, showed a majority of 78 to 45 against the measure—enough to effect the majority cast by the first ward, which cast the heaviest vote.

Comparison of the vote by wards shows that ward 1 passed all measures by substantial majorities.

Ward 2 approved all but the re-assessment measure, which failed of passage by two votes—42 to 41.

Ward 3 turned down both charter amendments, and passed the fire apparatus bonds by a majority of 27.

Ward 4 approved all measures.

Inasmuch as the first charter amendment carried the new zoning system of assessing costs for property, hereafter all property within 100 feet of a paved street will bear its share of the costs, as follows: The first 40 feet 50 per cent, second 40 feet 25 per cent, third 40 feet 15 per cent, fourth 40 feet 10 per cent.

OREGON VEGETABLE SEASON COMING ON

Home grown fruit and vegetables are appearing on the Eugene market with the coming of the summer season. Home-grown egg plant is selling for 20 cents a pound, and green and wax beans are expected to be on the market within the next week.

Home grown raspberries and loganberries are unusually fine this year, the former selling at \$2.25 per crate and the latter at \$1.75. Strawberries are becoming scarcer, and are selling at about two boxes for 25 cents.

The gooseberry season is nearly over. Oregon field tomatoes and green peppers will be on the market in two or three weeks here, and Oregon green corn by August 1. Currants, red jelly and jam are expected in a day or two.

Highway Route to Prineville is Good

"With the exception of only a few bad spots the McKenzie highway into central Oregon from Eugene is in good condition for automobile traffic," according to Otto Jones, publicity representative of the Oregon state fish and game commission, who came through the pass by motor from Prineville where he attended the American Legion convention as well as visited in the interests of the fish commission. Although the tourist traffic through the pass is not very heavy as yet a number of cars were passed, Mr. Jones stated.
