

FREUD DOCTRINE ASSEMBLY TOPIC

"The less the term 'don't' is applied, the better," declared Dr. A. A. Goldenweiser, noted anthropologist, of New York, in opening up the contributions of Freud to psycho-analysis.

"Don't" lead to regressions, which, according to the Freudian theory, may break out in dangerous forms.

The study of regression, of the unconscious mind, was the greatest contribution of the famous psychoanalyst, said Dr. Goldenweiser. By an open, frank discussion on sex as a basis of many of the mental disorders of persons, Freud did much to bring the world out into the light of understanding, away from the old dark, putrid ideas of repression of all ideas on this subject. Dr. Goldenweiser pointed out, by freeing the world from worry on this subject, that there has been made much more comfortable, it was stated.

Freud demonstrated that the conscious mind is only a part of even a normal existence, said Dr. Goldenweiser, and the great subconscious mind, which actually plays a large part in life, was shown to be very important. Although Freud places an undue emphasis on sex, his findings here were of great value, it was shown.

Criticism of Freud made by Dr. Goldenweiser were that in his psycho-analysis the normal and abnormal phases of operation were not identified clearly enough, and that his concept of the importance of sublimation and other phases was questionable on some points.

MOTORISTS MUST PROVE OWNERSHIP

TILLAMOOK, Ore., July 1.—Dr. W. C. Hawk, 69, of Bay City, near here, died today of injuries received when his automobile and a light coupe collided on the Coast highway Sunday afternoon. Authorities are seeking George Williams of Tillamook, alleged driver of the coupe whom, they say, witnesses accused of throwing liquor out of the coupe following the wreck.

Joseph Parker of Tillamook, who, with his wife and child, are said to have been with Williams in the coupe, today pleaded not guilty to a liquor charge and was placed under \$1,000 bail. Mrs. Hawk, who was with her husband, was slightly injured about the face.
