

WE WILL TAKE FOOD TO DETOUR

ST. MARIE, Mich., Mar. 21.—Still isolated in their snow and with only limited food, the six hundred residents of St. Marie, today were cheered by the news that a second transport plane was winging its way north from Selfridge to take them relief.

Several hundred loaves of bread and foodstuffs taken to the snow-bound settlement Friday by another transport plane and by a big team of provisions as are the 1500 lbs. of meat, a snow motor, flour and mangel supplies obtained from Drummond Island, farm-land.

The situation at St. Marie is regarded here as an emergency and it is planned to press relief plans into service immediately upon its arrival. Additional shipments and approximately 5000 pounds of accumulated provisions are being transported to the village state snowplows have been successful in efforts to open this region.
