JURY OUT FOR TWO HOURS IN FRAUD ACTION

Fall Gratified by Verdict; Mrs. Sinclair Cries With Relief

CREW OF PLANE WELL AFTER HAZARDOUS TRIP

Report of Successful Flight Comes as Surprise, as News Has Been Lacking

LONDON, April 21.—(A.P.)—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen says that the newspaper Politiken has received a message from Svalbard stating that Captain George H. Wilkins, Arctic flyer, landed near the Svalbard radio station at 11 o'clock this morning. A previous message to Politiken, also from the Svalbard radio station, stated that Captain Wilkins flew from Point Barrow and landed near Doedmannsoeira where bad weather stopped him for five days. Doedmannsoeira is an uninhabited island on the north side of Isfjord, about 25 miles from Svalbard.

WILLAMETTE ROAD WORK PROSPECTS ARE HELD BRIGHT

Prospects for the start of construction on the five-mile section of the Willamette highway from Goodman to Black Canyon are much brighter now, according to the report of Judge C. P. Barnard of the county court, who returned Friday night from Portland where he attended the meeting of the state highway commission. Judge Barnard in a talk with officials of the federal bureau of public roads was advised that federal appropriations will not be curtailed this year and that if Lane county would advance the needed funds to start work, a contract would be let in the near future and the project would be under way by the end of May at least.
