

RED CROSS COURSE WILL START JULY 9

An opportunity for Red Cross secretaries and volunteer workers to obtain a week's intensive instruction in matters pertaining to present-day Red Cross activities and administration will be offered at a Red Cross Institute to be held at Portland, Ore., the week of July 9, in connection with the summer sessions of the University of Oregon.

The institute, for which the university will charge an enrollment fee of \$3.00, will be conducted by Miss Margaret Barnard, executive secretary of the Lane county chapter of the Red Cross at Eugene. Emphasis will be placed upon the home service work of the organization, both as it pertains to ex-service men and to civilians, but there will be opportunity for discussion of all other phases of the Red Cross program. Method of chapter organization and effective cooperation with other welfare agencies are topics which will receive particular attention. The courses have been designed for persons already having Red Cross experience but who are interested in securing up-to-date information on the work of the organization and a broader knowledge of its activities.

Miss Barnard, as well as being a Red Cross chapter executive of several years standing, is also a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon in its social service department and has had thorough training and experience in the problems of community organization and welfare.
