HOOVER'S OREGON MANAGER ELECTED G. O. P. DELEGATE

PORTLAND, May 21.—(AP)—Oregon's preference for candidates for national and state officers were on record today as a result of Friday's primary. Relations of the G. O. P. added totals, and the only change from the late Saturday tabulation was the placing of Herbert Hoover's name as manager, Fred E. Kiddie, among the seven republican delegates at large.

Early reports had him trailing in eighth place. All the republican delegates at large were pledged for Hoover.

Governor Smith, who carried the democratic endorsement over Senator James E. Reed of Missouri, and Senator by substantial leads, was three of the four democratic delegates at large on the face of returns available today.

On the democratic side in the second district Walter M. Pierce, former governor received the nomination by writing in; in the third district W. C. Culbertson was unopposed.

Results in the state contests showed only increased figures for Sunday. The nominees were: For supreme court justice George Rossman and John L. Rand, incumbents.

23 Skidoo Sign For Kletzing

Defeat at the polls Friday does in no way hamper the good nature of L. V. Kletzing, candidate for republican nomination for sheriff, who lost the contest to his opponent Earl E. Luckey. Kletzing takes an optimistic view of politics and in an analysis of the vote says: "In making a close survey of the final-official returns of the voting Friday I found that I had carried one precinct by the large majority of two to one, I felt elated over this till I look again and noticed that the precinct where I received such a large majority was the Mount precinct and only three votes were cast. I received two, my opponent one."

"In two precincts I received a handsome goose egg. These were Glenda and Herman. My opponent carried a total of 19 votes in these precincts. The largest vote I received in any one precinct was Eugene number 8 where I led by 57 to 71. I carried my own precinct also two of my opponents precincts in Springfield. In total I carried twenty-three out of 101 precincts and I guess that means skidoo."

John Marsh for the first time in five contests for the position of county clerk for the present term, had an opponent at the primary. Marsh came through with a handsome majority in the 33 precincts of the district, carrying all but one. Marsh in a statement Monday expressed his thanks to the voters' support of the polls.

Ben F. Keeney, county assessor, also had a little statement of his appreciation. Keeney said "I wish to thank the voters of Lane county, both republican and democratic parties, for the support given at the primary election. The position of county assessor is doubtless the most difficult of all county offices to fill. The county in its requirements of law and give general satisfaction to the majority of the people is no easy task and to secure such a vote as given me without my making any campaign, I feel justifies an expression of appreciation on my part."

Keeney received the democratic nomination as well as that of his own party. The democratic vote was: Keeney 292, Eddy 34.

Lawrence N. Blowers issued the following statement Monday: "I wish to thank The Guard for courtesies shown me while a candidate for delegate to the republican national convention. Though defeated I am proud of the fine vote given me by Lane county and the state (outside Multnomah county). To the voters of Lane county my sincere thanks and best wishes."

Official county of Lane county vote was under way Monday at the office of W. B. Dillard, county clerk. Mrs. Margaret Rapp, of Eugene, and W. O. Cook of Bailey, are on the counting board. It is expected that the official count will take several days.

Judge G. F. Skipworth voiced his appreciation of his support at the polls by Lane county voters. Judge Skipworth received the republican nomination for circuit judge as well as that for his own party. This will be Judge Skipworth's third term as circuit judge in this district, comprising Lane, Benton, Lincoln, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties.

Earl E. Luckey, successful candidate for sheriff, thanked his supporters at the polls in a statement issued Monday. The following is the statement of Luckey: "I want at this time to thank the voters of the county for their support at the primary election of my candidacy for the nomination for sheriff, and assure them that I appreciate it very much, and if I am elected, I will show my appreciation by giving my very best service."

MURDER STORY (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1) although officers today were recalling that Smith had been seen with Robert Clark who was found murdered west of La Grande during the winter, a short time before the supposed time of the crime. Smith discussed the murder of Clark at considerable length with a newspaper man after the body was found but no suspicion was held, either by officers or others.

Smith was about five feet two or three inches in height and probably weighed about 125 to 135 pounds. He had long wavy, dark hair, had a tendency to be hard boiled and occasionally wore a sombrero. He claimed to be a detective and said that he had taken lessons in fingerprint work. He was friendly, talkative, and by trade a lumber millworker. There are reports about town he was an adopted son of Mrs. Smith.

Smith had a prominent Adam's apple and nose. He had curly hair and had to get a position with the state road department.

BROTHERS DRIVING CARS IN COLLISION

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., May 21.—(AP)—Cars driven by Cecil Eddy and Roy Eddy, brothers of Black Butte, met in head on collision last evening on the shortridge hill, on the London road. The car was on its way to Cottage Grove from Black Butte and the other was going from Black Butte to Cottage Grove.

In one car were Mr. and Mrs. William Eddy, parents of the two drivers, also Mrs. William Eddy, sister-in-law. Although the cars met at considerable speed on a turn in the road, Cecil Eddy was the only person seriously injured. He suffered severe gashes and the bicep muscle of the right arm was severed. He was taken to a Eugene hospital after treatment here. The others were treated here for minor cuts and bruises. The cars, both of the same kind, were complete wrecks.

Cecil Eddy is at the Pacific Christian hospital, Dr. W. H. Dale who is attending him, said he was badly injured but would recover. He is suffering from a severe scalp wound as well as road injuries to his arm. The accident occurred about 7 o'clock Sunday evening. The curve where the cars collided is said to be the most dangerous one on the road. Mrs. Eddy, the mother, sustained a broken wrist and thumb, according to Jack Howard, Cottage Grove correspondent for The Guard.
