A few weeks ago Eugene barely nipped out the Wendling nine, and only accomplished that feat when two Wendling errors in the ninth let in two Eugene runs, and the locals took the game by a single score.

Among the former Pacific university players on the Wendling nine are Jim and Jack King, second baseman and outfielder, Jim King is a Eugene man, working at a local shoe store, and he has been playing bang-up ball for the mill city gang. Another outfielder from the Pacific university is Hutt, while Amburn, pitcher, is a fourth.

All four started in college days, and have been out of school long enough to have played several years of semi-pro ball in the valley. They are fast players, and faster thinkers. Their years of experience together have made them a smooth-working outfit.

The Eugene team took a workout Tuesday evening, in preparation for the game with Wendling. It was a fast session, with batting and fielding work both on the list. Another practice will be held Thursday, and the third of the week on Saturday.

The game Sunday will be Wendling's first appearance on the local diamond this season.
