

SERVICE CLUBS TO DECIDE ON CONTEST

Presidents of all the Eugene service clubs have been called and have agreed to take up the selection of a candidate for the Goddess of Liberty contest at their meetings this week, says Russell Brown of the McDonald theater, in reporting developments for the contest to select the Goddess of Liberty to reside over the American Legion's fourth of July celebration, July 2, 3, and 4.

The contest opens June 18 and will be held at the McDonald theater. The contest is to receive a certain percentage of all tickets sold at the theater during the contest, which runs two weeks, to help in defraying expenses of the celebration.

From Eugene will be selected the Goddess of Liberty. Columbia and Justice are to be named from outside cities in the county.

Each ticket bought at the theater during the two weeks will entitle the purchaser to a vote for one of the candidates to be named.

Each candidate is to have special nights at the theater when additional votes will be secured.

McKenzie Water

Eugene Beautiful GARDEN STUFF

If a penny saved is a penny made, a family garden offers an opportunity to turn spare time into cash which is hard to beat. Given fertile soil, the recipe for a good garden is work plus water. The water costs little and insures a crop. Intensive cultivation is necessary and that means work. But if one likes to garden, this work becomes a form of healthful recreation and the fruits of the garden are almost altogether clear gain.

THREE 1927 GARDENS

J. M. RANDOLPH, 1082 Olive St., produced from a strip, 18 by 140 feet, over 300 lbs. of potatoes and supplied the family table with fresh and canned vegetables for practically the whole year with some fine musk melons for dessert. His average water bill for the six summer months was only 24 cents more than for the six winter months.

P. J. SEUFERT, 1892 Charnelton St., cultivated a plot, about 40 by 60 feet, which supplied two families with fresh and canned vegetables. His average water bill for the six winter months was \$1.30 and for the six summer months \$3.07, a difference of \$1.17, the cost of irrigating his garden and grounds.

HUGH H. EARLE, 473 East Broadway, cultivated a plot, 25 by 32 feet, which more than supplied the family with fresh vegetables and from the surplus 38 quarts of string beans, 12 quarts of carrots and 68 quarts of tomatoes were canned. His average water bill for the six winter months was \$1.30 and for the six summer months \$1.57. The extra water cost for irrigating his garden was just 37 cents per month.
