The Girls' picnic is to be held at the I. O. O. F. hall on Sunday. All members are invited to meet at the I. O. O. F. hall on Sunday.

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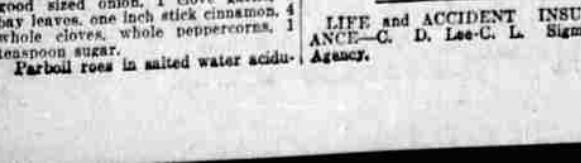
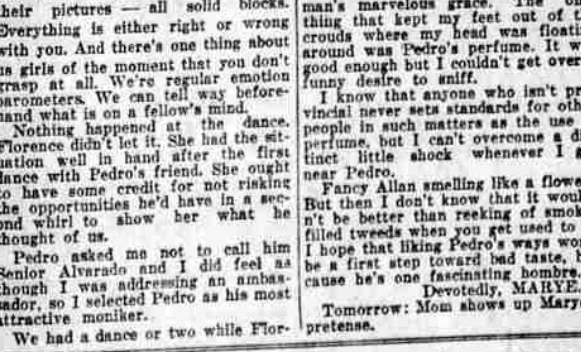
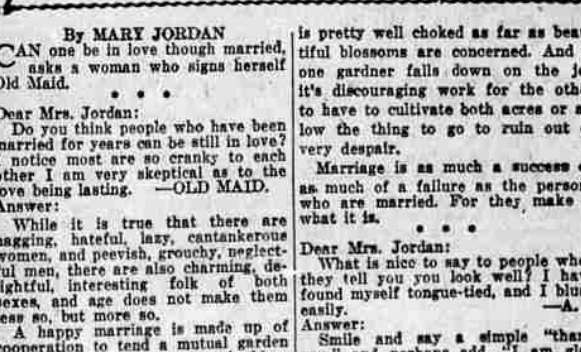
