Stricter Physical Examination Urged

SPRINGFIELD, June 21.—(Special.)—Stricter physical examination certificates for men applying for marriage licenses was urged at the state health officers' meeting in Portland this week. It is announced by Dr. W. H. Pollard, Springfield city health officer, who returned Wednesday evening from the session.

Another big problem for education was that of reducing the stream pollution by cities dumping sewage into streams. Dr. Pollard stated, The group suggested that gradually this be eradicated, as fast as cities can furnish funds to change this procedure.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM LIKED

Prospective students of the University of Oregon and their parents are highly pleased with the new undergraduate program of study just adopted. It was found by Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of liberal arts and sciences, who has just returned to the campus after an extensive trip into eastern Oregon. Parents and students are especially pleased with the arrangement whereby students may enter the university and spend two years before deciding definitely on their specialization courses.

Many students reach college age without knowing definitely what line of lifework they wish to follow, and many of these waste a year or two in some specialization department before finding they wish to take up something else, it was pointed out. Under the new system at Oregon students will gain a broad cultural background during the first two years, have an opportunity to decide what work they like best and then specialize during the last two years. For those students who have already made up their minds there are the professional schools in the university, or definite subjects may be taken in the college of liberal arts and sciences in addition to survey and option courses.

Students who enter the university next year and do not wish to join one of the professional schools will be offered survey courses in four general fields. These are languages and literature, biological sciences, mathematics and physical sciences and social sciences. Survey courses in two of these are to be taken each year for the first two years. Option courses will be offered the second year. From knowledge gained from these students may choose specialized work for the junior and senior years.

The Oregon plan is already attracting national attention, and is to be adopted by several other institutions soon.

OSLO, June 21.—(AP)—A local newspaper commenting on the disappearance of the French plane with Roald Amundsen aboard on its search for the North Pole today stated that Amundsen said before he left that he was especially interested in the party of seven which drifted away in the balloon. The paper thought it was possible that Amundsen and his companions had flown straight to the east and landed on the sea. Hoel, an explorer who will accompany the Russian ice breaker Erebus in its rescue work, said the men in the balloon had probably been carried out to sea between Northeast land and Franz Josef land. He did not think the Krause would search for Amundsen's plane but suggested that the ice breaker Malign which was in the neighborhood should go to the seaplane's assistance.

The polar fliers, Captain Sir George H. Wilkins and Carl B. Eielson, who arrived at Bergen last night, expressed an anxiety when informed that nothing had been heard since he started for Tromsø.

A telegram to the Afterpost from Kings Bay said it was thought that Amundsen might have flown to Franz Josef land.
