

PIONEERS BUILD NEAT LOG CABIN

BROWNSVILLE, June 21.—(Special)—The Linn County Pioneer association has built a log cabin, in the park, not far from the grandstand, which is a replica of the cabins of the earliest days. This will be the association headquarters during the picnic and will house relics that are the property of the association, and contain such additional pieces of furniture as are needed to comfortably furnish the cabin in the manner of the time.

There is a "spider" i. e., a sort of frying pan with legs, used in cooking before an open fire, all spinning and carding equipment, glassware of the olden time, coverlets, hand woven blankets, and chairs, poster bed, all such associations with the life of the early times. There is the chair in which one dear little lady sat as she pressed the plains—the saddle bags carried by a circuit rider whose passage extended over widely scattered districts, connected by terrible roads fraught with danger.

The Queen Mother, Mrs. Rebecca Morris, will make this her headquarters, and it will be a real treat for the people to be able to meet and talk with her. Mrs. Morris' own parents were pioneers of 1840, and her life has been one with rich and varied experiences.

Mrs. Morris, and others of the old-timers, will demonstrate the use of the spinning wheel, cooking before an open fire, and others of the household arts that are being forgotten in the ever changing development of modern conveniences.

The Pioneer association has been about the whole year, working out the building and its equipment, and Mrs. C. B. Saunders is in charge of assembling and arranging the furniture.
