

TAMMANY'S GUARD ON WAY TO SOUTH WITHOUT WALKER

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Tammany's guard was on its way to Houston today without Mayor James Walker, who has been selected as floor leader for Governor Smith in the democratic convention. The guard was confined to his home in New York because of a severe cold. He is expected to leave for Houston tomorrow or Saturday. George W. Brown, leader of Tammany hall, left by train last night.

He refused to make any prediction "in politics," he said, "you can't make your omelette until you have your eggs."

A party of 73 delegates from five states, including 18 from Massachusetts and Brooklyn, left for Houston aboard the steamer Shawnee today. The legend, "democratic convention special."

NORMAN MACK SPEAKS
HOUSTON, Texas, June 21.—(AP)—Norman Mack was speaking for Governor Alfred E. Smith in a statement issued last night. Norman E. Mack, national committeeman from New York, pointed out that he was expressing his own views when he said Governor Smith stands for the state's rights and personal liberty for the individual.

"I was not talking for Governor Smith," he said, "but for myself. In my statement I was expressing my own convictions. I have stood all along."

He said he had no consultation with Governor Smith and his views were not those of Smith, but his own.

George R. Van Namee, pre-convention manager for Governor Smith, also issued a statement saying no one here is authorized to speak for the New York executive on prohibition, the league of nations or any other subject.

"Governor Smith will take care of that himself," he said.

Anderson Faces Charge of Fraud

SALEM, June 21.—(AP)—Obtaining money by false pretenses is charged against J. A. Anderson, claiming to be a California lawyer, in a warrant for arrest issued here yesterday. Anderson, accompanied by E. J. Frazier of Eugene, is accused of persuading stockholders of the insolvent Cosmopolitan chain stores to pay him 10 per cent of their subscriptions as fees to start litigation against the company. The whereabouts of Anderson is not known. Frazier has been about Salem for several days, and on Tuesday told State Corporation Commissioner McCallister that he would pay back the money obtained. He turned over \$500 to McCallister as part of the amount. It is believed the two men collected about \$1500. The charges against Anderson are based on affidavits obtained by McCallister from some of the stockholders.
