His mother was Rosalie Applegate, daughter of the late Jesse Applegate who crossed the plains to Oregon from Missouri in 1843. 2000 MEN IDLE AS STORM RAGES

WHEELING, W. Va., July 13.—(AP)—Wheeling and towns along the lower Ohio valley today were recovering from the worst storm in 12 years. At least 2,000 men were idle as a result of industrial plants and mines being flooded when small streams overflowed.

Moundsville bore the brunt of the storm. The loss there being estimated at \$200,000. Homes were washed from their foundations.

Only one loss of life was reported, that of Albert Law, a negro, who was drowned near Wellsburg.

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TOUR SCHEDULE OF COUNTY IRRIGATION FARMS ANNOUNCED

The third annual tour conducted by the Lane County Horticultural Society cooperating with the county agent to observe and study supplemental irrigation systems used in growing truck crops will be held on Friday, July 20, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The itinerary for the tour with a statement of the type of pumping plant, source of power, method of distributing water, and crops being grown on each farm follows:

9:30 a. m.—Wendell Bartholomew place on river loop 2, lower Santa Clara. One mile from Pacific highway. Small overhead sprinkler system attached to household pressure system. Electric motor. Miscellaneous truck crops.

10:30 a. m.—Don Shaffner place on River avenue, about one quarter mile east of Pacific highway. Large capacity bulldozer type pump attached to overhead sprinkler system with oscillators. Electric motor. Miscellaneous truck crops. Also has portable flooding outfit driven by a gasoline engine. Mr. Shaffner will also show a trial of fertilizers on cabbage.

1:30 p. m.—Truman Chase farm one-half mile below the Ferry street bridge and near the Eugene country club. Electric motor driven water lifter. Underground pipe distribution system. Irrigates 7 flooding. Caneberries and other truck crops. Also potatoes.

4:00 p. m.—Chase Gardens. Centrifugal pump attached to large overhead sprinkler system. Also has centrifugal pump operating a flooding system. Both pumps are driven by electric motors. Miscellaneous green house and outdoor truck crops.

4:30 p. m.—Frank Bartholomew place on McKenzie river about four miles northeast of Springfield. Portable gasoline engine driven centrifugal pump. Irrigates by flooding. Has potatoes, beans, beets, and other truck crops. Mr. Bartholomew has a good demonstration of fertilizers on early potatoes.

F. E. Price, extension engineer of the Oregon State Agricultural college, will take part in the tour and discuss various irrigation problems. The county agent states that all persons interested in supplemental irrigation systems are invited to take part in the tour.

**ANTI-SMITH MEN
BARRED ON BALLOT**

DALLAS, Tex., July 13.—(AP)—The names of Texas democratic candidates for state offices who have refused to work for the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith, today were barred from primary ballots in three counties pending the outcome of a test case.

The third reversal for democratic party balloters came yesterday when the Galveston county executive committee refused to place the name of Thomas B. Love and other anti-Smith democrats on the ballots for the primary, July 28. Love, former democratic national committeeman and a leader of the ultra dry faction of the party in Texas, is a candidate for lieutenant governor.

Prior to the action of the Galveston county committee, Love's name was barred from ballots in Cameron county when a district court judge denied an application for a writ of mandamus to compel the committee to recognize his candidacy. His appeal from this decision is pending before the civil court of appeals at San Antonio.

The Automobile Club of Southern California has listed 142 improved public camps that may be utilized by visitors in the National Forests of that state.



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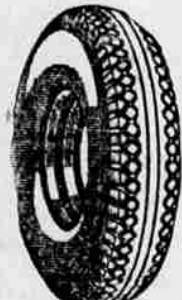
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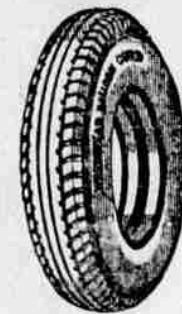

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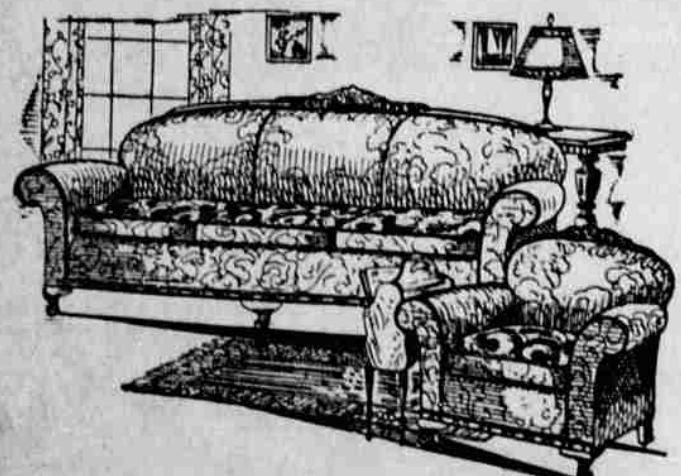
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
