DEATH CHAIR STORY

at 12:15. With heads supported in cupped hands, they sat silent, their bodies shaken by chills despite the intense heat in the stone house that had been their home in the prison. In plain view was the execution chamber and the chair.

There was no sombre darkness in the place. Instead, there was brilliant light and shadow of polished steel. The white men went to the chair first. Those executed were: Milford "Red" Lawson, 35, who murdered a neighbor in his mountain country; Orlando Seymour, 21, convicted of the murder of a Louisville merchant; Hascue Dockery, 21, charged with slaying two women and a man; Chas. Mittra, 23, convicted with Seymour; William Moore, 45, negro; James Howard, negro, and Clarence McQueen, 38, negro.

The negroes, apparently crushed earlier in the night by the nearness and certainty of death, recovered their spirits to a greater degree than the white men before the time came for them to pass down the corridor of steel.

Howard entered the chamber, singing "Sweet Lily of the Valley" and, as he sank back in the chair waved his hand saying "Gentlemen, how are you all feeling tonight?"

TWO IN GEORGIA—MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga., July 13.—(AP)—The second double execution within two weeks took place at state prison here today when Sam Gower, 52, and Predia Taylor, Fulton county negro, died in the electric chair for murder.

TWO OTHERS HANGED—JACKSON, Miss., July 13.—(AP)—Two negroes were hanged today for murder.

Will Durdo, convicted of the slaying of Clarence O'Neil near Askew in 1927, was placed on the trip and pronounced dead 12 minutes later.

At Mendenhall, Greene Kirk, sentenced for killing H. W. Hemby and Carl Nunnery, negro officers, went to the gallows at 10:35 a. m. and was dead 11 minutes later.

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RESCUE STORY

leader of the Russian rescue expedition. His report follows:

"Within three miles from the Viglieri group, the Krassin sighted the remnants of an airplane, the abandoned machine of the Swedish flier, Lundborg, and the red tent of the Italia from which was coming smoke signals in response to the deafening siren blasts continually sounded from the Krassin.

"The Krassin then drew up close alongside of the ice field which was harboring the victims. I climbed down a trap ladder which was lowered from the boat and found myself in the outstretched arms of the rescued men who embraced and kissed me as they wept tears of joy.

"They said that throughout they had pinned all hope on the Krassin but did not expect it to come so soon.

"All those rescued and taken aboard were well save Cecconi who had a broken leg, but his condition is not grave."

Prof. Samoilovitch said that the crew of the Krassin then began loading. Lundborg's plane aboard the Krassin. It was in this machine that the Swedish airman made a perilous landing on June 24 on the ice and succeeded in taking off General Nobile. On a second flight, the plane turned over as it landed and Lieut. Lundborg found himself stranded with the five men still remaining. After 13 days of hardship, shared with the men that he had hoped to rescue the Swedish flier was taken off by a comrade, Lieut. Shyberg, who dared the ice to rescue his companion.

FOYN, ISLAND FIRST—Soon after the Viglieri group had been rescued, a heavy fog came up and immediate progress of the Krassin was made impossible, but as the fog lifted it was able to continue its battle with the ice floes.

The first intention of the ship is to proceed to Foyn Island where several persons were sighted who as yet have not been identified. These men signalled back that she would pick them up in returning from the Viglieri rescue. Prof. Samoilovitch expressed the belief that the men were Alpine chamois who were sent in search of Nobile's men six weeks ago.

No word had been heard from this little group which started afoot for Foyn island for many weeks and they were virtually given up for dead many days ago.

After this group is picked up the Krassin will continue back to the group of the Russian flier, Chukhnovsky, who with four members of his crew is stranded along Northeast Land. Chukhnovsky in Tuesday first

sighted the Italia's walking party, whose leader, Dr. Finn Malmgren, Swedish meteorologist, had died, and notified the Krassin of their position.

Chukhnovsky, on his return flight to the Krassin, became lost in the fog and made a forced landing near Cape Platen. His landing gear was broken, but he and his men immediately set up a camp and by wireless urged the Krassin to rescue the two members of the Malmgren group who were in a starving condition.

After Chukhnovsky is picked up, the Krassin will proceed to Virgo Bay where the pilot will establish a base for further flights in order to seek trace of Roald Amundsen and the six men who were carried off in the bag of the Italia when the gondola was torn loose. These men have been given up for lost, but in view of the almost miraculous rescue of Mariano and Zappi, every effort will be made to find them.

Further details of the rescue of Mariano and Zappi were received in Moscow today. These men wept and laughed with joy as they were wrapped in blankets by the rescuing party and carried aboard of Krassin.

For 13 days they had had nothing to eat and for warmth they had only two blankets left.

On sighting Chukhnovsky Tuesday evening, Mariano cut big letters from a piece of tarpaulin to form the words: "Good! Help!"

When at length they sighted the Krassin, Zappi feared that the tiny iceberg to which he and his comrades were clinging would be smashed to bits and the two Italians waved their hands frantically to their would-be rescuers to stop. The Russians, fearing that they would smash the little ice refuge, stopped about 200 yards away and the crew laid a small board bridge from the boat to the iceberg along which the Italians were carried to safety.

OTHERS HOPED FOR—MOSCOW, July 13.—(AP)—Hope for the party of six men carried off in the bag of the dirigible Italia on May 25 and since given up for lost has been revived by reports reaching Moscow indicating that the location of the group is known.

General Umberto Nobile, now at Kings Bay, has sent a message to the rescue ship Krassin stating that the group, referred to as the "Alessandri" party, was not far from the present location of the Krassin.

Latest reports received in Moscow indicated that the men were at a point 80.45 north latitude and 80.31 east longitude. This would place them northeast of Foyn island, near which the Viglieri group was rescued.

With these reports, which were not confirmed, came a revival in Moscow of belief that Roald Amundsen, the missing Norwegian explorer, was likely to have joined this group in his flight from Norway to rescue the stranded men. This theory was first advanced by Fridtjof Nansen, noted explorer, that Amundsen was likely to search this group.

SEARCH STATUS GIVEN—(By The Associated Press)—The status of the crew of the Ill-

fated Italia and various rescue parties today was:

Italia Crew—Known Dead: Dr. Finn Malmgren, meteorologist, died attempting to reach land; Vincenzo Pomella, motor attendant, killed in crash May 25.

Rescued—General Umberto Nobile, commander, and seven of his crew, including Natale Cecconi, motor chief.

Missing—Six of staff of Nobile, including Lieut. Arturo, navigator, Prof. Ponremoli, Schenckis, and Dr. Ugo Lago, journalist.

Missing Rescuers—Party of Roald Amundsen, Norwegian Polar explorer, who left Thomsen, Norway, in French plane and disappeared June 18. Party included Lieut. Adolf Dietrichsen, Norwegian Arctic explorer; Commander Rene Gilbaud, French pilot, and three other men.

Party afoot which tried to make way over ice to Italia survivors, includes three men.

Rescuers Marooned—Crew of Russian plane from Krassin marooned near Cape Platen, includes Pilot Chukhnovsky and four others.

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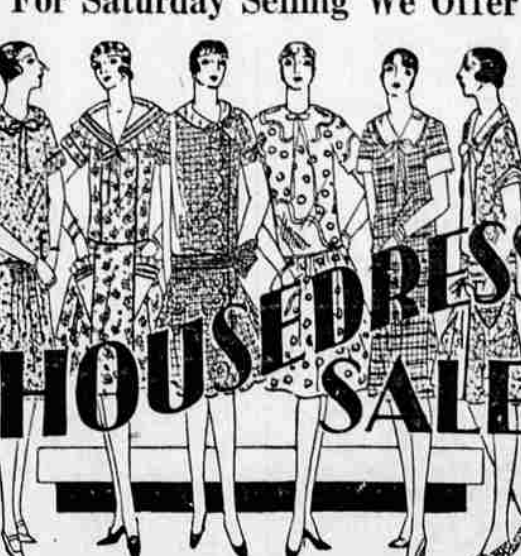
