

OPERATION FOR WORLD PEACE IS ASSEMBLY TOPIC

When all costs and honors of war taken into account, when all the evils involved in seeking political independence through economic independence through the sword are compared, when teaching and experience of the economic world show that economic progress comes with peace and not with conflict, it is inevitable that some way the nations of the world will learn that prosperity and security is to be

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etermined through the process of co-
operation.
This was the declaration of Dr.
Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the
University of Oregon, who delivered the
assembly address here Friday
morning before the summer session
students.
"Future greatness will be more
largely secured by a policy of accomo-
dation than it will by a policy of ag-
gression," said Dr. Hall, who talked
on "America and World Peace." The
need for scientific research to show
that such a theory is based on facts
of experience, and leaders who will
bring to the people the conviction
that war does not pay, were stressed
in the address.
The principles of equal opportuni-
ties to all and special privileges to
none should be kept in mind in inter-
national affairs, Dr. Hall said.
"America is competing with the great
commercial nations of the world for
trade. This competition for com-
mercial development can lead to one
of two alternatives: one is another
war, fought in the hope of obtaining
such a broad dominion as will insure
commercial independence, and the
other is to unite in the joint effort
to prevent such a conflict and to sub-
stitute the principles of equality for
all and special privileges for none.
The nations of the world will find
their real protection when they join
the forces of all in a statesmanlike
effort to preserve the liberty and
prosperity of each."
