School Library Books Here for Children

Approximately 2000 books, purchased for school libraries of Lane county, have been received at the office of R. J. Moore, county school superintendent, and will be ready for distribution in a few days.

Mr. Moore stated that the shipment, which includes books recommended from the state librarians' list, is worth \$1585. Funds are raised annually through a library fund system at the ratio of 10 cents per pupil. Only books recommended by the state librarian may be purchased.

Mr. Moore is having the books segregated now and states that district clerks may be able to get them at his office in a few days.

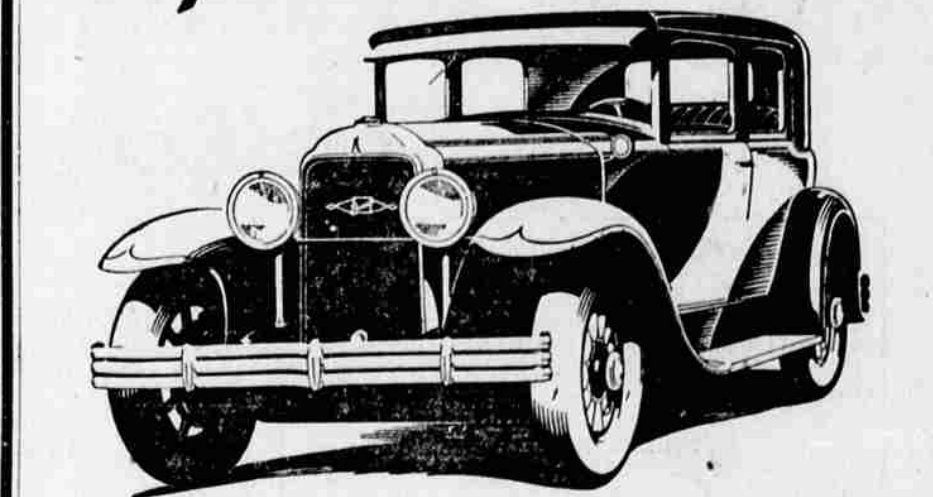
