

CHICAGO TELEGRAM LEADS NEW ANGLE IN MELLUS MURDER

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13.—(AP)—A Chicago telegram telling of a young woman hastening across country with a \$5000 bill, started officers investigating into a new tangent to the slaying of Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, the "killer" of Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, who was arrested for her slaying.

The telegram signed "Sergeant S. Sullivan" was addressed to Capt. Ray Cato of the police detective bureau. It said that "Kelly was guilty" but that he had been influenced by one "Virginia Grove." The young woman, the telegram said, had left Los Angeles soon after the killing a week ago Sunday. Enroute so the wire read, the woman had displayed a \$5000 bill to passengers and said she planned to continue on to New York aboard the 20th Century Limited and will for France next Friday.

Capt. Herman Cline, chief of detectives, though doubtful that "Sergeant Sullivan" was a member of the

Chicago police or otherwise responsible, wired the Chicago police chief to identify the sender.

"Kelly, accused of beating the wealthy clubwoman to death with a bottle after five years of illicit love, pleaded not guilty to charges of murder. Trial date was set for August 27.

Attorneys for Kelly failed in an effort to have their client released on \$50,000 bail when Judge Douglas Edmonds promptly denied the motion. He set next Wednesday for further argument.

A young divorcee, said to have a bruised and badly discolored eye, and numerous scratches on her face, was sought by the police today for questioning in connection with the investigation of the murder of Mrs. Mellus.

The woman, according to the officers, who refused to make public her name, has been absent from her home in Beverly Hills since a week ago at about the time that Mrs. Mellus' body was found in her luxurious home and Leo P. Kelly, her "butcher boy" lover, and accused slayer, was dragged from his hiding place in a closet.

The funeral arrangements will be made later from the Veatch funeral home.

LEADERS TAKE UP PROGRAM OF CLUBS

ernor can appoint who would be totally free from any suspicion of partizan-ship."

Although not going quite so far as Sheriff Taylor in the suggestion of outside investigation, District Attorney John Medley declared that should any cases growing out of the tangle be presented to the grand jury he would ask for a special prosecutor to handle them.

"I don't want to conduct a newspaper trial, and I have nothing before me on which to base a criminal case. But those involved or any citizens who are interested should know that they have the right to present to the grand jury any matter growing out of this situation which they believe the grand jury should take up."

"And should any such matters be presented to the grand jury, I would feel it desirable to ask Judge Skipworth to name a special prosecutor to handle them. I think this would be advisable because of my past association with at least some of the people involved."
