Menu For Today

BREAKFAST—Gantelope, crisp broiled bacon, scrambled eggs, rice and toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Beef, broth with vegetables, crisp whole wheat toast, raspberry tapioca, milk, tea.

DINNER—Breaded veal cutlets, potatoes au gratin, buttered green beans, frozen banana salad, crackers and cheese, milk, coffee.

Frozen Banana Salad

Three bananas, 3 tablespoons preserved ginger, 1-2 cup chopped nut meats, 1-2 cup cream, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup mayonnaise. Peel bananas and scrape off the fuzz. Cut in small neat dice and

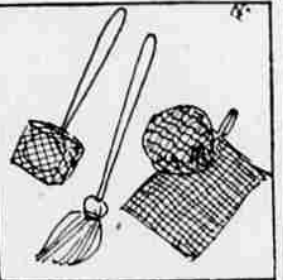
sprinkle with lemon juice. Use about 2 tablespoonfuls of the syrup over the preserved ginger and cut the ginger in small pieces. Add to bananas with nuts, cream and salad dressing. Mix lightly and turn into a mold. Pack in three parts ice and one part ice cream salt and let stand two hours. Unmold and cut in slices. Serve on a bed of crisp lettuce.

This salad can of course be frozen in an iceless refrigerator.

When the Astons went to summer cottage or camp they always carried with them a few conveniences. Mrs. Aston said that she saw no sense in putting up with all sorts of inconveniences just because the family was supposed to be roughing it. In fact she said she thought that such a procedure was really rough on Mother.

So a soap shaker with a supply of soap which would later even in hard water was first on the list.

Second came dish mops. She usually took along a half dozen at least. Some sort of metallic scraper, either in ball or flat shape, was her next necessity. This metallic scraper accomplished wonders with the stuck-on saucepan, the greasy skillet and frying pan.



For curtains at the summer cottage they chose old cloth. This was put on the rod with a large enough heading so that it slipped easily. Then the curtain could be drawn to shut out the sun. They were not affected by moisture or rain. They did not need constant laundering and no hemming or fixing was needed.

Oil cloth covered the table at breakfast time also. This was the simplest of cottage table coverings. It wiped off easily and always added color to the table.

Candlestick and matches were at hand in many places. Lying in a cottage is not so bad if you surround yourself with small aids to comfort.
