

Eugene Romps on Albany, 13 to 1, in Valley League Battle

LOCALS HAVE BIG CHANCE TO LAND IN SECOND PLACE

Eugene's valley league baseball team went on a rampage at Albany Sunday, and came home with a 13 to 1 victory tucked under the belts of the players. Twelve hits, four of them for extra bases, served to down the Alcos, and their downfall was complete.

The locals started off in the first inning. With two out (Gould walked, Hildings singled and Orr walked) to fill the bases, Van Dyne singled and scored Gould and Hildings. Van Dyne scored second, and the next Orr scored when Graham batted out a three-bagger. Husband made the final out.

In the second the locals continued their batting spree, and ran in five more runs. Another was added before Fortier, fast ball artist, was taken out and Hite, southpaw, went in. Hite held the locals until the ninth inning, when with two out again, Van Dyne singled, Graham whammed out a two-bagger and Husband smashed out a home run.

Albany's lone tally came in the fourth.

Fred Burton pitched a steady game for Eugene, behind the big lead the locals recorded him.

Jack Van Dyne had a perfect day at bat, bunting out four singles in four times up. Don Husband hit three out of four, one of them a home run. Frank Graham got a double and a triple, and Cottoer Gould got a triple.

The victory puts Eugene in third place in league standing, and means that another victory over Albany in the final game here next Sunday will assure the locals of second place in standing.

The disputed game with Salem still is on the boards, but a story coming out of Salem says that the Senators probably will give the game to Eugene rather than play the last inning over again. That would assure Eugene of second place, without an argument.

Bend, with five straight wins, cannot be headed, and will walk off with league honors even if she loses to Salem next Sunday.

BUCKY HARRIS MAY LINE UP NEW TEAM

Two or three and perhaps four major league clubs will make a change in management before the 1934 season starts. The clubs practically committed to a reorganization are the Detroit Tigers and the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Chicago White Sox, in spite of a provisional promise to Lena Blackburne, are dickering for another new leader. And, more surprising, the Washington Senators probably will start the next campaign without Bucky Harris.

Considering that Harris gave Washington two championships and has been doing very well with an inferior and "bad-luck" team, it may be surprising that the club owners are considering a change in management. But, if nothing happens before the winter meetings to block the transfer, Harris will become the manager of the Tigers.

The circumstances that almost compel the Washington owners to make a change in management are entirely of a financial nature. Harris is one of the highest salaried managers in the game. The club lost a lot of money last year and has lost so much already this season that it really is in financial difficulties.

It is known that the owner of the club, Charles Griffith, owner of the club, is grateful for the valuable services that Harris has given to the club but he knows that the club has to be rebuilt entirely and that the material available cannot be made into anything winning combination for several years even under the most brilliant manager or miracle-maker in the world.

Harris knows of the financial condition of the club and he is prepared to take a cut in salary when his contract expires at the termination of this season. He feels that when the club is losing money he should be willing to take a reduction in salary because it is largely up to the manager to keep the gates clicking.

He wants to stay in Washington even at a reduced salary but he figures the club might benefit by a change. He feels confident that if a change is to be made he will not be transferred to a club he would not care to play with and he would like to go to Detroit.

It is known that Frank Navin wants him if Griffith will let him go and Griffith is said to be willing to discuss the transfer.

It would be the obviously fair thing for Griffith to consider the preference of his young manager if he is to make a change. Harris has earned and returned dividends on the salary paid him and it would be imposing upon fine sportsmanship for the Washington officials to which his salary in half and saddle him with a team that is not going anywhere for at least two years. Washington is a tough town on a losing ball club and the suffering that goes with the management of a losing ball club is worth real money.

Detroit has a better ball club than it appears to be in the league standing and with a playing manager, who has recognized ability as a leader, in charge of the team, the Tigers certainly ought to become a first division club.

It is understood that the White Sox have put out some feelers to Washington about Harris and this would indicate that Blackburne is still the "temporary manager" that he was classified in the announcement made

by the club when Ray Schalk "quit." Blackburne says he was assured that he was to be retained as the manager next season if he delivered but those assurances from Comiskey haven't been so much in previous cases.

Donnie Bush has told his friends that he doesn't want any more of the Pittsburgh club and he has been mentioned as a successor to George Moriarty in Detroit but if he is after the Detroit job he will not be able to get it unless the Tiger officials fail to get Harris.

PERU MARATHON HIKER BOTHERED

TEXARKANA, Ark., Aug. 13.—(AP)—After trudging across Texas on the last lap of an 18,000-mile hike, Augusto Flores, 18-year-old Peruvian Boy Scout, finds it almost as difficult to walk on modern highways as through the jungles of South America.

He is determined to walk all the way from Lima to New York, and therefore he is rather annoyed as motorists continually ask him to ride. Every day he declines proffered lifts, and sometimes he has trouble convincing would-be benefactors he wants to walk, for he speaks little English.

While in Texas the Peruvian youth easily obtained food and learned the best way for his slow journey, since he was able to speak in his native tongue with the many Mexicans he met. But he wondered, as he left the border of the Lone Star state, whether he would get along so well where he must rely on his English.

Flores hopes to reach New York by Christmas.

Four companions set out with him from Peru. One was killed in a fall on a mountain, another was drowned in a tropical river, a third died from snakebite and the fourth turned back after a severe illness. Flores himself is in perfect health.

Kerosene soaked cotton was stuffed in cracks, windows and other vantage points of the stables housing the racing strings of Mrs. John R. Hertz and John R. Madden.

The barking of the dogs attracted the Hertz guards. Madden's negro trainer, Chuck Walker and the watchman investigated, arriving in time to see two men running from the scene. Investigation disclosed the oil soaked rags, all ready for the torch.

Besides Reigh Count and Anita Peabody, Mrs. Hertz's recent \$25,000 purchase, the fully Nettle Stone, was in the Hertz stables. Seaway and Nearby were in the Madden barns.

The stables that house the horses of Rear Admiral Cary R. Grayson, Sam Ross and strings trained by Woods Garth and James Healy are in the immediate neighborhood.
