BOULDER DAM BILL TO GET EARLY VOTE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Opponents of the Swing-Johnson Boulder dam project have agreed to permit the measure to come to a vote at an early date despite the prospect that they will be defeated on the final vote by the forces behind the measure.

By an unanimous consent agreement, the senate decided today to limit all speeches on the bill to 15 minutes each after 8 p. m. Thursday. This limited debate agreement was proposed by Senator Kendrick, Wyoming, democrat. Arizona leaders of the opposition to the bill refrained from making objection.

Under this agreement, a final vote on the bill may take place late this week or early next week.
