

GOVERNMENT ASKED TO CARE FOR PEASE

The sentencing of Vernon Pease, charged with burglary, was put over until the February term of court by Judge G. F. Skipworth Thursday morning after a consultation with Dr. William Kynkandall and Dr. Seth Karon, and attorneys for the state and the defense.

An attempt is being made to have the federal government give Pease hospitalization in an effort to cure him from the effects of a head injury suffered while in service at the San Francisco Presidio. James King, defense attorney, has requested the Veterans' Bureau at Portland to take Pease in charge and has been promised an early decision in the case.

Pease was arrested early in November for the burglary of two guns and a cornet from the home of J. T. Giffey, 344 Tyler street, while on parole from the Monroe, Wash., reformatory. About three years ago, he was given a suspended sentence on a burglary charge by Judge Skipworth who held that Pease was not responsible for his actions.

UNIVERSITY BOY TRAVELS IN ARCTIC

Traveling for eighty-two days in a canoe from the headwaters of the Yukon river 2100 miles to the Bering sea, trekking far inland across the frozen tundra and skirting the icy shores of the Bering sea and northern straits was the experience of Amos Burz, Portland adventurer and student at the University of Oregon school of Journalism last year, who has just completed a five month's exploration trip through Alaska and Siberia. Burz has been doing research work on the Oregon campus this week.

One of the most interesting features of the entire trip was the visit to King Island. Burz declared, "King Island is situated 150 miles north of Nome and is but a small rock pinnacle rising out into the Bering sea. It covers an area of about a half mile square, and on all sides except one is almost perpendicular to the sea. On one side the slope is about 45 degrees and it is here that the village is located."

"The 100 islanders depend on the walrus for their livelihood," he went on. "The men of the community kill the walrus when the ice pack comes down from the Arctic, bringing the animals with it. Walrus meat is their only food, and walrus skins are their only shelter and clothing. When the walrus fall to come down on the ice packs, the natives must journey to Nome for provisions, or starve to death."

"The islanders live comfortably," Burz continued. "Their houses are warmly heated with seal oil lamps which burn continuously. Doors to the houses are only two or three feet square and elevated some distance from the floor, and one is likely to enter the parlor headfirst with his feet in the air."

The King islanders are expert at carving many little images, animals and articles from the tusks of the walrus, according to Burz. These they take to Nome in the spring and trade them for necessities and ammunition. They make the trip in komlaks, large skin boats in which 35 to 40 persons including women and children are wedged in with the dunnage.

There are 150 natives on this cliff-dwelling colony, and of these only one can speak English. He was formerly a whaler on an Arctic fishing ship.

This Alaskan trip was made for the purpose of obtaining moving pictures for the Jesse G. Still film laboratories in Portland. Twenty thousand feet of film were made for use in adventure pictures which are to be synchronized. Several hundred were made photographs for magazine illustration.
