MANY TURKEYS GO FROM LOCAL MART

More than \$200,000 worth of turkeys, included in 29 cars, will be shipped out by Christmas time by the Eugene branch of Swift and company. Five carloads have left this week. The number of cars is twice as many as sent out Thanksgiving time when 10 cars were shipped to the east and south. The condition is rather unusual, because the Thanksgiving buying is usually much greater than for Christmas.

However, this has been a late year, buyers report. Even with the large numbers bought and shipped for Thanksgiving and Christmas, there are many turkeys left because production was unusually heavy this year. The prices for this Christmas are five to six cents cheaper than last year when buying prices were around 35 to 36 cents. Prices this year remain at 30 cents for number ones, the price having been maintained at almost the same figure for the entire Christmas buying season. In the Douglas county, pool, however, number ones have been quoted at 32 cents.

The territory represented in the 29 cars sent out by Swift and company is from Halsey to Riddle. The quality for the Christmas market is excellent, and better than at Thanksgiving on the whole, buyers report.

POOL PRICES GIVEN

Buying quotations in the pool of the Eugene branch of the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers for the week ending December 19 show a decrease of two cents over the previous week's prices. The pool as announced Friday morning was as follows: Extras, 42 cents; standards 40 cents; brown extras 38 cents; firsts 34 cents; extra mediums 34 cents; first mediums 30 cents; newets 28 cents. Eggs dropped steadily during that week in all markets.

EGG MARKET STRONGER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—(AP)—The upward price surge in the Chicago egg market yesterday had its effect here today with slight increases in the prevailing low cost of eggs.

There was a half cent reduction in lower grades of butter, butter prime firsts were 47 and firsts 46 cents today.

No change in turkey or poultry prices. The supply of fresh vegetables has been reduced considerably by the prolonged cold weather.

There was a peculiar circumstance in the banana market. Large quantities have been shipped in and price has risen to 8 cents a pound for good quality. These factors have left much stock on hand, aiming to better quality, which was being offered as low as 6 cents.

COMMERCIAL BULLETIN

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The wool market has been quieter but a few houses have had a fairly good business and at prices fully equal to any that have yet been paid; in fact, the market is very firm, especially for half-bloods and below."

The foreign markets, also, are very buoyant. Australia has been rather against the buyer and South American markets have become better stabilized and somewhat firmer. The secondary markets of Europe are fairly firm.

Contraction has commenced in western Colorado at 35 to 37 and possibly 38 bands for medium class, although less active for the moment.

Mohair is rather slow, with some sales of turkey hair, especially where price can be made attractive. The Commercial Bulletin will publish the following quotations:
