Building permits issued in Eugene during 1928 totaled \$1,277,189 according to the report of W. H. Alexander, city building inspector. The figure is about \$150,000 under the 1927 total. Eugene did not get credit for the \$200,000 machine shop erected by the Southern Pacific just outside of the city limits. The new men's dormitory erected by the University of Oregon at a cost of \$400,000 is the most costly structure ever built in Eugene.

WESTERN UNION TO EXPEND SUM HERE

Several thousand dollars will be spent in Eugene by the Western Union Telegraph company in the installation of the new Simplex printing telegraph system of automatic telegraphy. A total expenditure throughout the United States of \$20,000,000 is scheduled, according to word received by J. A. McKevitt, local manager.

The new machines are expected to arrive this month for installation. While these machines will take the place of key telegraph operators, Eugene will retain both operators here as Simplex operators. Harry Simpson is now at Portland attending the Simplex school and R. E. Strand will leave next week for Valparaiso, Ind., to enter the Simplex school for maintainers.

Both local men will be retained as Simplex operators, one as a maintainer of the machines, and both as assistants on the Morse since four quads and a duplex will be retained here for the use of through wires for the substituting a typewriter-like apparatus which a stenographer could operate for the Morse code which required months of training. The Simplex printer really "types" by long distance. The machine weighs but 70 pounds and is small and compact.

The receiving set in a district city receives the impulses transmitted over the wire letter by letter, in such a way that corresponding type-bars are pushed up and down by the impulses on the dry side of gummed paper tape to a telegraph blank for delivery.

While many men 70 per cent of Western Union messages are handled automatically, the Morse operator will still be indispensable for some types of work.

EUGENE POLICE ARE KEPT BUSY IN 1928

The 1928 record of eight persons killed in traffic accidents far exceeds the records for the three previous years, when but one was killed each year due to traffic causes, according to police records. Injuries in traffic accidents were numerous during the year. The fatalities included three motorcycle riders, three pedestrians, one fireman and one infant.

Arrests by the police during the year covered a wide range of charges. The totals are as follows: Arrested for investigation, 43; given lodging, 247; doors left open, 280; bicycles stolen, 102; holdups and robberies, 6; arrested for desertion from army and navy, 7; arrested for drunkenness, 90; larceny from automobiles, 182; lost dogs, 18; stolen cars, 109; broken and entered houses, 43; larceny from buildings, 177; lost article reports, 17; missing persons, 8; arrest for auto theft, 9; arrest for check forgery, 14; arrest for robbing streets after hours, 6; arrest for "mooching," 7; arrest for larceny, 12; arrest disorderly conduct, 10; arrest for driving while intoxicated, 8; arrest for possession of weapons, 3; arrest runaway boys, 19; arrest malicious mischief, 2; attempted larceny, 1; arrest violation of garbage ordinance, 2; arrest receiving whisky in jail from outside, 1; arrest burglary, 6; arrest hit and run driving, 3; arrest break and enter and safe breaking, 5.

said Mr. Hobi. This plane is a duplicate of the one used by Art Goebel in his flight to Honolulu for the Dole prize, except for the motor which will be a Wright J-4 of about 300 horsepower.

These motors are said to be the newest development in airplane motors, and are in the process of manufacture at the present time. For that reason, states Mr. Hobi, the planes are not being delivered until spring.

Soon after the new plane arrives, the Hobi company plans to inaugurate a passenger service between Eugene and Portland, using their new ship for the purpose. At Portland, through connections to Seattle will be possible by transferring to the planes of the Union air line, said Mr. Hobi.

The Travelair monoplane to be used in this passenger service will be of the latest model with heaters in the cockpit for the passengers, seats comfortably upholstered, and a large baggage compartment in the rear of the passenger section.

In bringing the Travelair planes to this country, the Hobi Airways will be presenting a complete line of airplanes for every possible use, it was said. The monoplanes will be equipped with Wright J-4 motors and the Wasp type motor. The biplanes will be equipped with Wright J-4, G-N, Ackelson, Challenger, Warner and Hissco motors, all engines of the latest model, according to Mr. Hobi.
