

UNIVERSITY PLANS SIX CLASSES FOR EUGENE RESIDENTS

Six evening classes for the people of Eugene and nearby communities are being offered during the winter term by the University of Oregon. These classes will be held in Johnson hall on the university campus and will begin Wednesday, Jan. 2, closing on March 10. They will be open to any one who is interested.

Several of the courses are a continuation of work given during the fall term, but one new course by Dr. George Rebec in lectures in the philosophy of history has been added. Some of the topics that Dr. Rebec will include for consideration are: Are there any basic ideals that have governed that process in human living called history? Is the so-called antithesis between east and west based upon ideals? What about the "economic determination of history?" From the classical to the Hellenistic Greek point of view, Rome, Why Christianity? What was medievalism? What do we mean by the modern world? Is the modern world a return to pagan foundations? The contemporary drift.

The course in psychology of the common branches given by Prof. Thomas Gentile, which came on Wednesday night last term is being scheduled on Thursday night this term. In this course Prof. Gentile will discuss the child mind as it approaches a study of the common branches of the elementary curriculum. The course is planned to be of practical assistance to teachers in active service, and will include a study of the following elementary school subjects: Language, grammar, composition, nature study, construction work, health projects, music, drawing, penmanship and spelling.

Another course in education will be that given by Prof. Stetson in the Junior high school. This is a continuation of the fall term course in the same subject, but will be varied during the winter term to include a study of some of the practical problems in junior high school organization and teaching that are to be made a special field of study in the Eugene schools during the remainder of the year.

In twentieth century literature, Prof. S. Stephenson Smith will discuss the American novel and English drama since 1800 and will also give attention to recent English and American poetry. This course will be a continuation of last term's work.

Prof. A. H. Baldridge states that his course in practical public speaking will be largely work in extempore speaking, and will include a study of how to prepare a speech, how to overcome self-consciousness in presentation, and how to speak effectively. The work in public speaking is especially for business men and women, and others who are called upon to present questions or material to the public or to groups.

The work of Prof. Zane in comparative art studies will be concerned with a study of the American arts, not so much to develop historic eras and sequences as to study specific examples of the arts and in relation to the artists who produced them. The work will consist of lectures, lantern slides, reports and class discussions, and will familiarize the lay person with much that is best in American art and give him a basis for appreciation and interpretation. Enrollment in the class does not depend upon previous training in art, but may be taken by any one who wants to know more about art and artists.

Arrangements for registration will be made the first night of each class although persons may attend a class session before enrolling if they so desire. All classes will be held in Johnson hall, which is the Administration building on the university campus, from 7:15 to 9:15.

FIRE DEPARTMENT HOLDS LOSSES LOW

Eugene losses through fire in 1922 amounted to \$14,330.50, according to the annual report compiled by Ray Hicks, assistant fire chief. The actual loss amounted to but \$3700, as insurance adjustments came to \$10,570.50.

December losses were the highest of the year, reaching \$2900, but the entire amount was cancelled by insurance adjustments. The heaviest net loss was \$700 incurred in November with but \$800 insurance to offset a gross loss of \$1550. The February total of \$288 was offset to the extent of \$2435. The September total of \$425 was not covered by insurance. No losses of any sort were listed for October. A total of 252 calls were answered by the department in 1922.

Alder Wood in Forest For Sale
