Can you tell me how best I can have care and recuperate from a nervous breakdown? Should I go to a sanitarium? If so it must be reasonable in price and quiet as I can't stand noise.

I wish to know as soon as possible. Would not care to go to a regular hospital.

Answer:
Consult your physician on this subject, Mrs. B. He would know far better than I would just what is most necessary for your particular case. But in general I advise you to take things easy in the way of daily events. Do not worry. Dismiss all unpleasant thoughts from your mind. It can be done, and you will be building up nervous resistance for the future by gaining in self-control.

Live a regular life, with bed-meals at the same time every day, and regular periods of relaxation. Cultivate the things which interest you the most, keep up some real hobby which will give you some stimulation. Above all, be happy, and do not dwell on your ills.

Menu For Today

BREAKFAST—Apple sauce, cereal, cream, surprise golden rod eggs, extra toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Clear bouillon, toast sticks, onion dumplings, apple sauce, cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked canned salmon, potatoes au gratin, buttered Brussels sprouts, carrot orange and apple salad, squash custards, milk, coffee.

The woman in the country may find it convenient to substitute cabbage or cauliflower for the Brussels sprouts suggested in the dinner menu. This change can be made without affecting

the balance of food value in the meal.

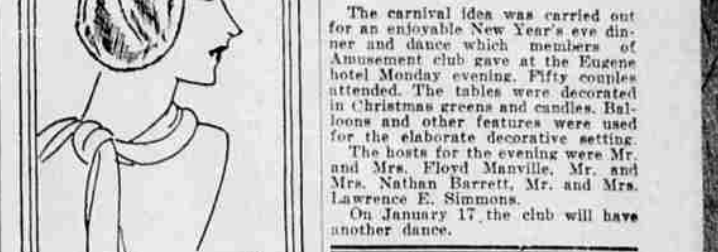
Onion Dumplings

Four large white onions, 4 tablespoons cold chopped meat, 4 tablespoons bread crumbs, tomato catsup, 1 cup flour, 2 tablespoons shortening, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, milk, or water, 1 cup sifted canned tomatoes, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 slices bacon, 1 tablespoon grated cheese.

Peel onions and simmer until tender but not broken. Cool. Remove centers and chop. Use art of the chopped centers with the bread crumbs and meat to make a stuffing for the onions. Add enough tomato catsup to this mixture to make moist. Fill onions with stuffing. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Work in shortening and cut in enough milk or water to make a soft dough. Roll to one-half inch thickness on a floured molding board and cut in flour squares. Put an onion in the center of each square and wrap the dough around it. Place in a baking dish and bake in a hot oven until brown. In the meantime cook bacon until crisp. Chop very finely with remaining onion from centers and cheese. Add with sugar to sliced tomatoes and serve to the boiling point. Pour hot over dumplings and serve.
