

BOLIVIA, PARAGUAY
BORDER CONFLICT
PROTOCOL SIGNED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(U.P.)—Complete agreement on the protocol providing for a settlement of the border conflict between Bolivia and Paraguay was reached tonight after a four-hour meeting of the special committee on mediation of the Pan-American conference.

The protocol will be signed Tuesday by the representatives of Bolivia and Paraguay, Diego Medina, of Bolivia, and Dr. Eligio Ayala, former president of Paraguay and delegate to the conference.

With the announcement of the complete agreement of the terms of the protocol, it was also made known that the United States, Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay and Cuba will be asked to name one member each to the commission set up by the protocol to investigate the border conflict.

In addition two other members will be named by each Bolivia and Paraguay, making nine in all.

Secretary of State Kellogg participated in the negotiations of the special committee which resulted in the agreement.

The agreement was reached despite the modification proposed by both Bolivia and Paraguay in the terms of the protocol proposed on Christmas day by the conference.

Following the meeting, delegates informed the United Press that changes, which had been made in the terms of the protocol as originally proposed, were "mostly of form."

It is understood the signature of the treaty was postponed until Tuesday so the pact can be put on formal treaty paper and a proper ceremony arranged.

NO RECEPTION AT
CAPITAL THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(U.P.)—For the first time since 1923 the white house will be closed to visitors on New Year's day.

The absence of President and Mrs. Coolidge on their holiday vacation on Cape Cod, Georgia, has caused the cancellation of the January 1 reception, a custom handed down from Jefferson's time.

During the Wilson administration the reception was cancelled because of the war and because of the president's illness after the war.

When Harding became president he renewed the New Year's reception and in 1922 shook hands with more than 6,500 visitors. The 1923 reception was cancelled because of Mrs. Harding's illness.

President Coolidge again picked up the custom in 1924 and continued it during his administration until this year.

WASHINGTON TOWN
DESTROYED BY FIRE

MCCLEARY, Wash., Jan. 1.—(U.P.)—The eve of the new year saw this little Washington town suffering a mass of smoldering ruins—the waste of a \$3,000,000 blaze that destroyed the door manufacturing section of the great Henry McCleary timber company mill here today.

Fire departments from all neighboring communities rushed to the aid of the McCleary volunteers and waged a five hour battle against the flames early today.

The fire was one of the most disastrous in the history of the lumber industry in Washington.

A large force of men will face the new year without employment as a result of the blaze. It will be impossible, lumbermen said, for the plant to be reconstructed in less than four months.
