

NEW BORN BABE'S BODY IS FOUND IN SHALLOW GRAVE

SPRINGFIELD, Jan. 7.—(Special)—The body of the new-born infant found buried in a shallow grave by the side of the road near Springfield Saturday was examined by the county coroner with no result of information as to the child's identity or condition at time of death. Decomposition of the body, which had been buried for at least a month, prevented a reliable autopsy.

The discovery of the body was made by a man who is said to reside near the shallow grave in which the body was found. This man, whose name is not given by the county sheriff, reported that he had heard several voices near the grave during the night over a month ago. It seemed to him to be some sort of drinking party. He investigated the scene the following day and found a shallow grave, freshly turned earth. Thinking that this might be a grave of a child, he dug down and found the body of a new-born babe. He did not uncover the contents, deciding, rather, to watch the box for the return of the owners.

Saturday morning he decided to open the box. He found the body, wrapped in a scant covering of rags. The sheriff's office was immediately notified and the body turned over to the coroner. So far no further information as to the child's parentage or cause for burial has been found.

ENGLAND'S KING HAS QUIET DAY

LONDON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Tonight's bulletin on King George issued at 7:45 p. m. said:

"The king had a quiet day. There is no change to report in his majesty's condition. The next bulletin will be issued tomorrow evening."

LONDON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—King George's physicians reported this morning that his majesty had a fair night's rest and indicated that he was holding the ground which they announced he had gained in their last bulletin.

London was blanketed with fog today but the dense atmosphere no longer caused anxiety over the king's condition. The king's condition was so improved that it was believed the oppressive weather conditions would have little if any adverse effect upon the royal patient within the palace walls.

Another significant happening was the king's removal from his bedroom into an adjoining audience chamber where he remained for one hour. This was the first time he had left his sick room during the whole seven weeks of his illness. While there was no official statement as to the effect of the removal on the patient, it was understood in palace circles today that the result had been entirely favorable.
