ASA KEYES' TRIAL TO BEGIN MONDAY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—(Special)—Seven defendants will go to trial here Monday on charges of bribery and corruption of public office, but the spotlight will be centered on one of their number, former District Attorney Asa Keyes.

After 25 years in the service of Los Angeles county he will appear in one of its courts as a co-defendant with men whom he allegedly failed to prosecute sincerely and with men who assertedly acted as "go-betweens" in bribery.

Already the case has become known as "The Keyes Case." Of lesser public interest are the other six defendants—Ben and Dave Getzoff, proprietors of the tailor shop in which the alleged bribery of Keyes took place; Ed and Jack Rosenbergs, former Julian case defendants; Charles Riemer, former investigator for Keyes; and Jacob Herman, alias Jack Bennett, central figure in the Julian Oil corporation collapse.

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RICKARD STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

The public is to be admitted to Campbell's funeral parlors from 8 p. m. to 6 p. m. Tuesday, and from 8 p. m. until Wednesday morning.

Funeral arrangements were made with Mrs. Rickard's consent by Jack Dempsey and Walter Fields, one of the promoter's confidential associates at Madison Square Garden.

Burial will be at Woodlawn cemetery.

With the death of Rickard, leadership in his projects for the immediate future, chiefly the proposed Sharkey-Strubling fight, reverted naturally to Jack Dempsey.

"I am terribly grieved," the former champion told the United Press tonight. "I have lost the best pal I ever had."

"Not only to me, but to the whole sporting world, Tex was a best friend. There was no one else like him."

"I will return to Miami Beach immediately after the funeral, and we plan to carry on with Rickard's ideas for the future, just as he created them."

"So far as we now know, the fight between Sharkey and Strubling will take place here, February 27 as originally planned."

Bore leaving for New York with her husband's body Mrs. Rickard announced that the following would be pall bearers: William Muldoon, Richard A. Hoyt, John M. Chapman, Col. John S. Hammond, Jack Dempsey, Harvey Gibson, J. P. McGuire and Walter Fields.

The sudden death of the promoter plunged into uncertainty the plans for the heavyweight fight between Jack Sharkey and Young Strubling, which Rickard planned to hold here February 27.

Dempsey will return to Miami Beach with Mrs. Rickard after the funeral and may assist in the promotion of the enterprise. It is not unlikely that the former heavyweight champion will develop as Tex's successor in the promotion of important prize fights.

Shortly after Rickard's death this morning, a telegram was received from his 80-year-old mother, Mrs. L. J. Adams, of Seattle, Washington. "Wish I were with you. Will come if needed," wired Tex's mother.

MOTHER HEARS NEWS. SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 7.—(Special)—Mrs. L. J. Adams of Seattle, mother of George L. (Tex) Rickard, heard the news of her son's death today with mingled grief and resignation.

"George was such a good boy to me," said the 80-year-old mother of the sports promoter after the first tears, caused by the news, had been brushed aside.

Mrs. Carlin, Rickard's sister, told the United Press tonight the mother had sent a telegram Thursday saying she would come to her son's bedside if he needed her. The telegram, however, was not received in Miami Beach, Fla., until after Tex's death this morning.

The family here was advised to

day that Rickard's funeral was to be held Thursday morning in New York. Mrs. Carlin said the time was limited to permit them to attend the burial ceremonies.

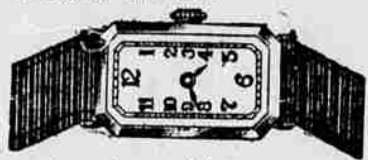
