Billed as a slug-fest from start to finish, the first boxing card under the auspices of the new Eugene boxing commission will be held at the Eugene armory Monday evening, starting at 8:15 o'clock. Bill Hayward who has a reputation for making fighters mix it or get out of the ring will referee all bouts, and will give all decisions.

The main event between Willard Norton and Punch 'em Paul Hunter should be one of the hottest affairs ever witnessed in the local armory. Norton is a two-listed fighter who never waits to rest, and Hunter is one of the sweetest sockers to come down the local pike. Hunter has fought here on three occasions before. His last battle was with Joe Blackwell, and Joe has declared since that "I never saw so many gloves in so few rounds before nor since as I saw

when Hunter swung them that night." The Blackwell-Hunter fight was a draw.

Since then Hunter has dropped some of his surplus fat, and is fighting in the welterweight class exclusively. His training has added speed, and the fight is expected to be one sweet affair.

Chuck Borden has had 50 ring engagements in his career, and is rated as a classy welterweight. His introduction to Eugene fans will be against a tough customer, the same Louis Sauer who got a six round draw with Norton on the last card here, in a hard-fought tussle. Both are fast, ring-wise and hard hitters, and the six-round event should be a mean one.

Everyone knows and is back of Jimmy Lee of the university. He will tangle in a four-round special with Young Harry Greb of Portland, who is rated as plenty tough. Jimmy is a knockout artist, so there's another tough scrap, and no fooling.

Al Cashman, also of the university, goes on the card in place of Ed Tracy, who could not make the grade because of injuries. Cashman is a calculating scrapper, with plenty of speed and aggressiveness. He will meet Young Joe Snel of Portland, in four rounds.

Turkey Red and Dan Hoone will swing the mitts for four rounds in the curtain raiser.

INSURE WITH HENRY TROMP

DESPITE DEFEAT OREGON HOOPMEN STILL IN RUNNING

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 20.—(Special).—Although the University of Oregon basketball team lost to Washington at Seattle Saturday, 35 to 20, Billy Reinhardt and his Webfoots basketmen are not discouraged nor have they given up hope, for this week the team goes on the road that will take it to eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana, and the results of those games will tell if the team will or will not remain a contender for northern honors.

Monday the Webfoots play Washington State college at Pullman in a game that will have much bearing on the conference race. The Cougars, by defeating Oregon State at Pullman Saturday, 30 to 18, have proven to be a dangerous combination and will be hard to down, if Oregon should lose to them they are practically definitely out of the race.

After a brief rest, the Webfoots will go to Moscow, where they will meet University of Idaho Wednesday. On Thursday they face Gonzaga at Spokane, and on Friday their weekly play on the road against Montana at Missoula Friday.

The Washington game was nip and tuck until near the end of the first half, with the score tied at 11 all. The Huskies dropped three field goals in rapid succession and the half ended 18 to 13 in their favor.

Washington added to its lead in the second half and scored six points before Oregon was able to make a single marker. Near the end of the half, after the Huskies had a comfortable lead, Heck Edmundson, Washington coach, rushed in his substitutes and Oregon's lead tumbled down somewhat.

The floor work of the Oregon players was superior to Washington's but while the Huskies dropped their shots into the hoop, the visitors missed many crumples under the basket. Summary:

BAGSHAW STATUS STILL IN DOUBT

SEATTLE, Jan. 21.—Whether Enoch Bagshaw is to remain as head football coach of the University of Washington was still a question today. With the student board of control insisting that he be ousted and the faculty athletic committee as strongly determined that he remain. With the two bodies to whom coaches are responsible, deadlocked, it was up to President M. L. Spencer to decide whether Bagshaw will finish the three remaining years of his contract. Dr. Spencer has said that he will be guided entirely by the legal phases of the dispute.

Confronted with a compromise proposal of the faculty committee to add a backfield coach to the staff and keep the "little giant" at the head, the student board turned to a lawyer for legal advice in the event Dr. Spencer denies their plea.

A special committee worked yesterday formulating a bill of particulars reciting students' grievances against Bagshaw. This is to be presented to Dr. Spencer by a special committee consisting of the nine student members of the board of control as soon as he grants them an interview. Copies are also to be sent to the university board of regents.

Meanwhile the faculty committee sat tight on its refusal to approve the board's ouster.

RECORDS SMASHED BY 'FLYING FINN'

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Paavo Nurmi, with three new world records to his credit, is launched on his second American campaign. The flying Finn lowered existing marks for 2,500 metres, one and five eighths miles and 3,000 yards at the Brooklyn college indoor championships Saturday night. Those distances may not appear in the record books, but the fact remains that Nurmi ran them faster than anyone ever has before.

Paavo attempted to set the new records on an eight lap track, with out banks, in the 13th regiment armory. He succeeded, despite the lack of competition, finishing the special 3,000 yard race with a half lap ahead of Ove Anderson, a fellow countryman. Once more the complete lack of American distance runners was emphasized.

Stop-watch in hand, indifferent to everything save the fleeting seconds which were not quite as fleet as he, Paavo timed himself carefully lap after lap, slowing up perceptibly on one occasion when he was a few seconds too far ahead of the time had planned.

The Finn ran 2,500 metres in 8:55, a mile and five eighths in 17:23 2/4 and the full 3,000 yards in 7:43 2/4. The best previous record for 3,000 yards had been made by Nurmi at Baltimore when he was here in 1925. Then he ran the distance in 7:45 3/5. Paavo's next American appearance will be at Boston next Saturday.

1929 TREK WILL BE ROUTED FROM YONKERS TO L. A.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—O. C. Pyle, who hopes to recoup last year's losses with a new coast-to-coast foot race during the coming spring, announced today that he had completed arrangements for a headquarters and training camp for the contestants at Rockaway Park, Long Island.

The 1929 race, to be from New York to Los Angeles, reversing the route of its predecessor.

Although he is demanding a \$300 entry fee from each contestant this year, Pyle said he expected to have 250 runners in line when the race starts on March 31. The promoter is leaving Monday in his "crusing coach" to map out the route of the race, and establish "night controls" at cities and towns between here and Los Angeles.

The training camp at Rockaway Park will open March 11, Pyle said, and the runners will work out over boards, sand and cobble stones to accustom their feet to the varying conditions of the long trek to the coast.

Canada will be represented by at least 30 runners, according to the promoter, who says he has entries already on file from distance runners and walkers of Italy, Germany, France, Belgium, Switzerland, Finland, Sweden and South American countries.

Pyle added that there will be no charge to the public for watching the race, although he estimates that 15,000,000 people saw last year's event, which was won by Andy Payne of Claremore, Oklahoma. This year's prize money is announced as \$50,000.

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CHRISTNER BOUT WITH SHARKEY IS EYED ANXIOUSLY

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—In the ham-like hand of a rather bald rubber puffer of Akron, Ohio, lies the fate of a \$50,000 venture at Miami Beach, Florida.

The connection between the Ohio city where they bake tubes and the Florida resort where they plan to hold a heavyweight elimination bout between Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling is that K. O. Christner, who, for the nonce, is Akron's best known citizen, is to meet Sharkey in a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden Friday night.

If K. O. Christner were just an ordinary second rater, there would be little public curiosity as to the outcome of his engagement with the big Lithuanian. But this Christner person is no ordinary second rater; he is a most unusual one.

The Akron heavyweight is the man who hit Knute Hansen so hard on the chin out in Ohio recently that the blow was felt all the way to New York, where it flattened the pocket-books and put to sleep the interest of several financiers who had just decided to back the Dane as a likely candidate for the heavyweight championship.

It is one, therefore, that Christner has a knockout punch, which he has landed upon a heavyweight who is virtually Sharkey's equal as a boxer.

A knockout blow of that sort upon the Lithuanian's chin would be heard throughout Florida. A recumbent Sharkey would be no use whatever as a principal in the proposed affair at Miami Beach. As a possible substitute, K. O. Christner would lack the Boston heavyweight's drawing power.

Item two: Can K. O. beat Sharkey, and are the promoters of the match with young Stribling risking their entire venture upon the outcome of Friday night's bout?

There seems no reason to doubt it.
