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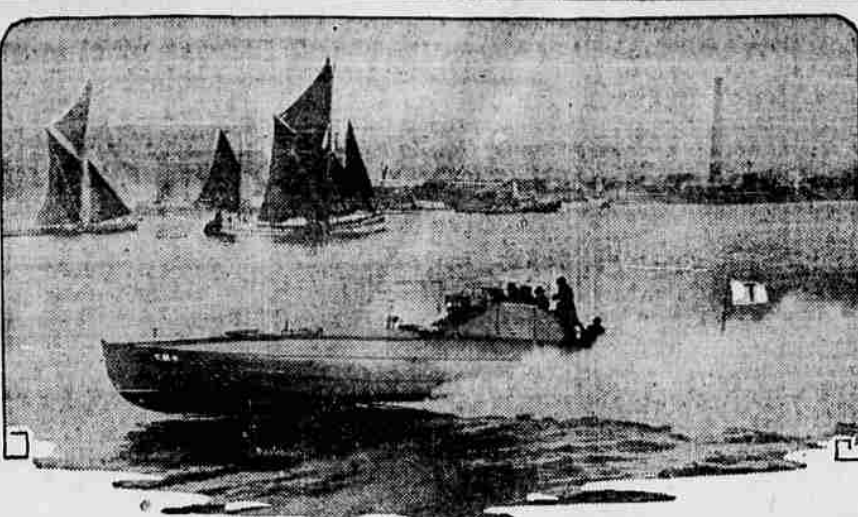

FATE OF 4 SHIPS
HELD UNCERTAIN

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The fate of four vessels, in distress far at sea, was uncertain tonight as land radio stations tried in vain to pick up further information of their plight.

The Radio Corporation of America's station announced that no word had been received since distress signals were sent out by the crippled ships during a storm in the north Atlantic Friday night and Saturday.

The vessels include: The British freighter Silver Maple, 780 miles east of Boston, with a crew of 40 men, and a broken steering gear.

The Italian freighter Capo Vado, in distress some 1,000 miles east of the Bermuda island, with a crew of about 25 men.

The Norwegian steamship Fernlane, which was helpless in a gale 500 miles southeast of Bermuda after losing its rudder, with a crew of less than 30 men.

The American freighter Diziano, grounded on the northern coast of Cuba, with a crew of about 25 men.

The coast guard cutters Tampa and Mojave are en route to the position given by the Silver Maple and due there in about 80 hours.

The Silver Maple sailed from Oran, January 15, for New York.

The Capo Vado, owned by the Genoa Shipping company, sailed from Constantinople, December 24, for Baltimore.

The British steamer Cleithra and the American vessel Western Knight, 80, said to be a member of the SOS club.

Officials expressed fear that the steam trawler Soier, which was due in Boston from the Georges banks, would not arrive.

The Soier, which was last week, had sunk with some 20 men. Continued search by coast guard vessels along the route failed to reveal a trace of the trawler.

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PIONEER OF OREGON
DIES AT PHILOMATH

Solomon Bowers, 87, one of the oldest pioneers of Oregon, died Sunday morning at Philomath. He crossed the plains in 1853, arriving in Eugene in the fall of that year, living in this vicinity since that time.

Mr. Bowers is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lucinda Yates Bowers, whom he married in 1858. Eight daughters and five sons were born to the union and of these, six daughters and four sons survive. These are John Bowers, Renton, Wash.; Mrs. John Ogilvie, Camas, Wash.; Mrs. E. L. Landers, Portland; G. B. Bowers, Renton; Benjamin Bowers, Corvallis; Mrs. Josie Campbell, Corvallis; Jerry Bowers, Philomath; Mrs. Roy Cheney, Portland; Mrs. E. C. Mann, Eugene; Mrs. Howard Peterson, Brownsville.

In addition, Mr. Bowers is survived by two brothers, John Bowers of Eugene and George Bowers of Miles City, Wash., and a sister, Mrs. Sarah Barlow of Portland. Forty-one grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren are living.

Funeral service will take place at the Hollingsworth funeral home in Corvallis at 1:30 Tuesday afternoon.

SNOW-BOUND CITY

PRAYS FOR BREAK

COLESBURG, Ia., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Colesburg citizens, isolated for the past three days by a huge barrier of ice and snow, gathered in church today and prayed for the opening of a path through the icy mountain to the outside world.

Food and fuel supplies were running low and the situation approached critical stage although no actual suffering had been reported. Relief had not appeared tonight.

Out of from all except telephone communication by the snow which drifted in from the mountains, the citizens tonight looked to the state highway commission for re-establishment of contact. All appeals made to the Delaware county board have been met with silence. Dr. W. E. Hook, mayor of the village, said in a telephone conversation.
