GRAND FORKS, B. C., Jan. 29.—Holding ten prisoners taken with the aid of a police force, the Grand Forks police today in their second clash with the Doukhobors fanatics.

The first skirmish was won last Friday by naked fanatics, when they put to rout two provincial policemen sent to arrest members of the colony for taking their children from school.

Returning to the attack yesterday, 14 police found 50 members of the colony, men and women, mobilized in a house. The fanatics resisted the invaders and a lively battle ensued in which the women joined.

When the officers turned the tear gas into the house there was a rush for windows and the heating stove was overturned. Despite the smothering gas and the smoke from the overturned stove, Streptikoff, leader of the colony, refused to leave the house.

Police dragged him naked into the snow before he ceased to resist.

The Doukhobors, otherwise known as the sons of freedom, are Russians whose religious tenets include the belief that Christ was wholly human. The rules of their sect also forbid the wearing of clothing even in sub-zero weather.

Streptikoff and two others were arrested for driving off the police last week and the others were held for their part in the second battle.

Word was received from Victoria, B. C., that the provincial department of education would press charges against the leaders of the colony to compel the members to abide by the school laws and send their children to the public schools.

men as well as do the technical side of the work. Mr. Christensen, Dr. Simon stated, had told him that if given the position he would make all the tests himself without extra cost to the city. Dr. Simon also stated that he understood that Mr. Lawrence was not qualified to make the tests, although being an excellent man for the practical side of the work.

Mayor Wilder said Tuesday that the efficiency of the department demanded that the inspector should devote his entire time to the inspection of the dairies and the handling of the milk and food stuffs, leaving the tests to be made by a special laboratory man.

Mr. Lawrence, he added, was equally qualified with Mr. Christensen for making the tests of milk samples.

Councilman Hendershott, Zumwalt, Lamb and Large took the view that the lack of action on the appointment was due to differences of personal opinion and that the matter will be settled after a little more discussion.

Both men, they say, are well qualified, and they are not unalterably opposed to approving the appointment of either. Those who favored Mr. Christensen in the council vote said they wished to give him preference because of his local associations.

Those supporting Mr. Lawrence stated that without personal preferences between the two men, they had supported Mayor Wilder because the making of appointments is his duty and his should be followed when no fault is found with the appointee.

Mr. Christensen is a graduate of Oregon State college, specializing in bacteriology and farm husbandry. He has been employed by the Damascus creamery in Portland and worked one year for Councilman Reid, himself a dairyman. He has been employed by several other dairies in the vicinity of Eugene.

Mr. Lawrence was born and raised on a dairy farm at Lexington, Mass. After attending Dartmouth college for several years, he ran his father's dairy for a number of years. After coming west, he was city milk inspector at Fresno, Cal., for five and one-half years. He holds recommendations from the Fresno city officials.

A recommendation by George Monroe, chairman of the police committee, asked increase in pay for members of the police force. The Eugene police are efficient, said Mr. Monroe, and should be paid what they could earn in other cities of the same size. The proposal was tabled until the next meeting.

The changes recommended by Mr. Monroe included: Chief of police, from \$100 to \$170 a month; that a finger print man be employed at a salary of \$150 to be increased at the end of the year to \$160; that the day captain be placed on the night shift with an increase in pay from \$135 to \$145; that patrolmen who have served two years or more be paid \$135 a month, all other patrolmen being paid \$125; that traffic officers in the service two years or more receive \$175 and those in the service a year or more \$160 a month.

Julian Straff, desk sergeant and fingerprint man, resigned from the force to become a deputy sheriff, said Mr. Monroe. Traffic officers, he explained, furnish their own machines and their salaries should be placed high enough to care for the added expense.

The sum of \$900, included in the year's budget, but not specifically assigned, was voted to be given to Mrs. M. S. Ady, police matron, for office expenses.

The city engineer was instructed to purchase and erect street traffic signs costing a total of \$700. The signs include 50 stop street signals, 200 parking limit signs to replace worn-out signs in the downtown district, 1000 metal pavement markers, and 12 star buttons.

The ordinance making the city recorder the city purchasing agent is to be followed by the city recorder. The ordinance has not been followed in recent years.

While the white-haired jurist, who is under fire sat with folded arms, seldom speaking to his counsel, Mrs. McPherson occupied the witness chair for several hours, calmly answering questions. She appeared to be perfectly composed, confident and friendly, giving the general impression of trying to be helpful to the legislators.

"Isn't it a fact," she was asked, "that Mrs. Kennedy (the evangelist's mother) said to you she didn't see why Judge Hardy should be worth \$2500 when all he had done was to use the temple radio to make political speeches?"

"No," That would have been totally untrue. "Why did you never pay him anything until this trouble came up?"

"Why, there wasn't any trouble," replied Mrs. McPherson, "no accusations had been made against me."

" weren't you anticipating trouble?" "I am always anticipating trouble. Some one is always making me the target for something."

" weren't you anticipating trouble when Joe Ryan came back from Carmel with his story?"

"Certainly not," Mrs. McPherson smiled faintly. "That was so absurd."
