

## TAX RELIEF BOARD TO BE CHECKED UP ON EXPENDITURES

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—(AP)—The property tax relief commission, which has prepared a program of tax relief for this season of the legislature, is to be checked up in the matter of its expenditures before the ways and means committee decides to approve its bill of some \$12,000.

When this figure was made known at the committee meeting last night there was considerable murmuring, and some questioning as to what authority the committee had to increase its membership from the five provided by the legislative resolution two years ago to more than 30 members.

Senator Jones and Representative Collier and Potter were appointed a sub-committee to investigate. Senator Bell, though he believed the committee's expenses were reasonable under the circumstances, urged that the committee discourage activities between legislative sessions by special committees from only one house of the legislature.

### Rehearsal Set For Reorganized Choir

The reorganized choir of Central Lutheran church will hold a rehearsal at the church Wednesday evening, Jan. 30, under direction of T. G. Kaarhus, choir leader. The hour is set for 7:30 p. m.

There are now 25 members of the choir, with Mr. and Mrs. Kaarhus, Miss Yella Olson and Mrs. Elmer Gilbertson among the soloists. Additional members are still being admitted to the membership of the choir.

Representatives Norvell, Smith, Weatherpoon and Potter and Senators Strayer and Jones attacked the bills designed to make the state labor department self-supporting. ### County Report On Health Is Made

Cases of influenza in Lane county showed a further decline for the week ending Jan. 23, according to the bulletin issued by the state department of health, Salem, being reduced from 10, for the week ending Jan. 10, to 12 for the week just past.

Besides the 12 cases of influenza in Lane county for the week ending Jan. 23, the following cases of communicable disease were reported: Diphtheria, 1; scarlet fever, 5; pneumonia, 1; chickenpox, 3.

The state at large had the following report: Typhoid, 2; diphtheria, 17; scarlet fever, 63; measles, 80; influenza, 247; whooping cough, 1; smallpox, 34; tuberculosis, 21; pneumonia, 36; chickenpox, 45; mumps, 25; epidemic meningitis, 5.

In addition to these, Clackamas county had two cases of septic sore throat; Coos county three cases of septic sore throat; Deschutes county one case of undulant fever; and Harney county one case of erysipelas.

Baker and Wheeler counties had not a single new case of communicable disease of any kind reported to the state health department.

### LOCAL LEGION POST GETS WIDE NOTICE

The recent membership campaign of the American Legion, with competition between the legionnaires and the Forty and Eight branch of the legion, has received nation-wide publicity, according to Arthur T. Mosen, adjutant of the legion, who has received a request from the American Legion Monthly for an account of the campaign, accompanied by pictures.

The legion turned in 73 members, winning 10,300 points, and the Forty and Eight 45 members, winning 5000 points. The total membership is now 330 members, and a further campaign will be opened after Feb. 1. The quota for this year is 550 members. Last year at this time there were 149 members, with 506 before the close of the year.

Of the two teams of the Forty and Eight, the winning team captained by H. B. Freeland, with 28 new members added to the legion, and a total of 3400 points, will be feted at a banquet by the losing team captained by R. H. Vincent, who brought 17 new members into the fold with 2500 points. The banquet may be an event of the regular meeting night, Tuesday, Feb. 18.

Names of the paid-up members of the legion will be printed on the honor bulletin board of the organization near the public market.

### Army Hunts Man To Present Award

In heroic James D. Long living quietly in this city or vicinity, blissfully unaware that the United States army vainly seeks to honor him as it honored Colonel Lindbergh, Commander Byrd, and other victorious airmen?

On the theory that he is appeals are being made all over the United States by army recruiting officers. Between them they hope to reach Long with word that he has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his part in the Alaskan flying expedition back in 1929.

As a sergeant in the army air service Long made a pioneer flight from Mitchell Field, Long Island, to Nome, Alaska, and return. He was the assistant chief mechanic, mechanic and observer of the pilot he accompanied.

Army records show that Long served throughout the World war, enlisting Aug. 17, 1917. At that time his mother, Mrs. Mattie D. Long, lived at Denton, Maryland. When he was discharged as a sergeant in 1922 he gave his future address as Billings, Mont. Since the flying cross was awarded him on Aug. 18, 1929, efforts to communicate with him have been unavailing.

### Administration Has Dry Law Set Back

## SENATOR DUNNE IS ALL PUT OUT OVER EFFORTS ON BILL

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Senator Joe Dunne of Multnomah and Columbia counties told the senate roads and highways committee yesterday just what he thinks of the legislature and of a citizen's efforts to accomplish anything by being a member of it.

Dunne, who is a member of the

committee, wanted a favorable report on the Mettaker and Robinson house concurrent resolution directing the state highway commission to widen the lower Columbia river highway. "I am Columbia county's only representative in the senate," said Dunne, "and I want to get this resolution adopted."

"Never mind, Joe," said Senator Kiddle. "You'll be re-elected anyway." "That's all the good it will do me," Dunne retorted. "A man wastes his time coming here. It's just like a boy spitting against the wind. It all blows back on him and muddies him all up."

Over Dunne's protest the highways committee voted to take all measures that direct the highway commission to do certain things and consider them later at one time.

Dunne is also making a fight to get Multnomah county's share of the state market road fund all turned over to that county. In the one-mill

market road law there is a clause included particularly to keep Multnomah county, because of its much higher assessed valuation than other counties, from receiving too great a share of the fund. This provides that no county in any one year shall receive more than 10 per cent of the total one-mill levy in the state. All over that amount is apportioned among other counties. Multnomah is the only county to which the provision applies.

Dunne got little encouragement from the other members of the committee. He said he would draft the bill anyway, and there was a tentative agreement between him and Senator Klepper that it would be made a Multnomah delegation bill.

Senator Klepper will prepare a bill that would make available to the public the information contained on motor vehicle accident reports filed with officers and sheriffs.
