

Northwestern Shatters World's Record In Oregon Meet

WEBFOOT FROSH HANDLED DEFEAT IN RELAY RACE

Northwestern University, swimming against a team of unattached college freshmen, officially broke the world's record in the 300-yard relay race. The midwestern team swam the course in 3:03.4, which was two seconds better than the record of 3:05.4, established by the Chicago Athletic club April 4, 1928. The Northwestern team was composed of Don Peterson, Dick Hinch, Al Schwartz, all individual champions of the 100-yard freestyle, and the Oregon swimmer, who won the 100-yard freestyle in the dual swimming meet, 41 to 26. John Anderson, who took the only relay race in the 300-yard freestyle, took the only place for Oregon by winning the 41-yard free style. Anderson had to better his own coast record in that race.

Three coast records and one national record were shattered tonight. Lennox of Northwestern, swimming the 100-yard breast stroke in 2:47, bettered the old record of 2:48.4, set by Peterson, Northwestern, in the 100-yard breast stroke. Peterson, Northwestern, broke his own national intermediate record in the 100-yard breast stroke, swimming in 2:47.4, when he swam his heat in the 300-yard relay race in 51.3.

NO CLOWNING ON FIGHT CARD HERE, DECLARES NORTON

Fed up with stories of the clowning antics of Red Millett, Seattle welterweight, Willard Norton of Eugene is determined that if the Seattle boxer comes to town on Friday night, there'll be a slaughter.

Norton takes this fight business seriously. When he goes in the ring he wants to kill it out, and not make the other fellow take the count from laughter.

Accounts from Seattle are to the effect that Millett is a sure-nough slugger, but that he also mixes indignant antics with his fighting. His opponent, either in pugilist or in villain, drops his guard for a moment, and then wham! Mr. Opponent hits the canvas from one of Red's blows, and it's all over but the counting by the referee.

Norton isn't going to drop his guard, even if Millett is standing on his head. If Millett wants to clown, according to Norton's own statement, he will have to find some other place to do it.

"He won't have time to clown," says Willard. "Maybe he can knock me out, maybe not, but he won't do it clowning. He won't have time to stop to breathe if he tries to get funny. You can mark that down."

The main event will be for ten rounds, the new three-minute round ruling being in effect for the fight. The fight card will start at 8:15 o'clock Friday evening, at the armory.

BALL TEAM BLAMED FOR LAW VIOLATION

BOSTON, Feb. 13.—(U.P.)—A complaint against the Boston Braves and the Outdoor Recreation league officials, charging violation of the corrupt practices act, will be made by the municipal court Wednesday by Attorney General Joseph E. Warner.

Announcement to this effect was made by the attorney-general late Tuesday in making public his findings in his investigation of charges that the Boston Braves had violated the corrupt act by donating \$30,000 to the league's campaign for Sunday sports.

The demand for an investigation of the Outdoor Recreation league grew out of the recent Boston finance committee's hearing on the charge of Braves' officials that bribes had been demanded of them by a Boston connellman.

Counsel for the parties involved have been notified to appear in court Wednesday, where they may be heard when the complaint is made, the report said.

If you want to see as nearly perfect a mystery picture as could be made with all the paraphernalia conceivable for spookdom, take in "The Terror," now playing at the McDonald as an all-talking.

There isn't anything left undone to give the creepy atmosphere. There are the very extreme characters and a ramshackle manor as the locale to begin with; then shrieks, an ever present wind to make black robes rustle and the drapes and hangings flop and float about, a terrific storm in which rain and wind make grotesque figures of all about; there are sliding panels, glittering knives that mysteriously disappear, toads hopping about at will, mysterious organ music that comes from an unknown nook in the house; there are spiritistic séances; there are secret passages with the traditional winding, spider-web stairs; there are wild looking detectives.

In Mystery

about, and figures garbed in black robes snooping about, there is a butler suspicious of everything, and a crazy looking man who "has love mysteries," and of course "The Terror."

The film is one of the cleverest burlesques I have seen in the films. "Caught in the Fog" was a clever takeoff on crook melodramas, but "The Terror" now comes along as a much more cleverly and skillfully filmed satire on mystery shows.

Despite all the opportunities for shudders and nervous screams, you find yourself laughing uproariously at the varied characters. Louise Fazenda, Edward Everett Horton, and John Miljan are a trio that make the whole show. Miss Fazenda has an outlandish make-up and has a way of shuddering and moaning that ought to be patented. Horton, with his ever present expression of being shocked, supplies much of the comedy in the role of a detective, unknown as such, but stopping at the manor as a lost golf player. He is the lover as you can guess how serious the romance theme is. Miljan makes a wild appearance with his beard and uncombed locks and is always reciting that classic bit, "This case reminds me," and proceeds to tell of some terrible murder or mystery, ending with a fiendish laugh.

The show is through Saturday, so don't miss it!

A. STAGG READY TO ABANDON TOURNEY

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—"Fina" may be written on the University of Chicago's national interscholastic high school basketball tournament after the eleventh prep classic the first week in April.

A. A. Stagg, founder and sponsor of the tourney is ready to abandon the event that last year attracted 42 championship fives from 88 states. If Stagg does not decide to abolish the tournament the national federation of state high school athletic associations may withdraw its national aspect as its meeting in Cleveland February 25.

Stagg does not intend to fight the national federation. "I have no desire to foster a tournament that does not meet with the approval of the high school educators," he said today.

In an effort to determine the attitude of the high school principals, O. W. Whitten, secretary of the national organization, has mailed queries to 8,000 principals all over the country. The answers will be used in determining the final action of the body at Cleveland.

Some disapproval of the tournament has developed in the western conference, where coaches and athletic directors have scored the event as a recruiting center for colleges.

Notre Dame Will Build Huge Bowl

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—(U.P.)—Notre Dame will erect a stadium seating 60,000 persons next spring to help keep the football team at home. The Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, president of the university, said Tuesday at a luncheon given in his honor by the Notre Dame Alumni club of New York. The stadium will cost \$750,000.

The Notre Dame eleven last season played on both coasts, beating the University of Southern California at Los Angeles.

Knut Rockne will not leave Notre Dame, Father O'Donnell said in answer to rumors that the famous coach might become connected with another school.

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FLASHY CANADIAN BEATS U. S. STARS

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13.—(U.P.)—American sprinters have been trying to match the bullet-like speed of Percy Williams at all sorts of distances but with uniform failure.

The Vancouver flier, double sprint winner at the Olympics, had beaten his rivals from below the border at 40, 60, and 90 yards in Boston, New York and New York before he accomplished the same thing at 45 yards in the annual Meadowbrook games in Philadelphia Tuesday night.

Williams' list of victims during his hot but meteoric American invasion includes such stars as Karl Wildermuth, of Georgetown; Jimmy Daly, of Holy Cross; Jimmy Quinn, former Big Game flash now competing for the New York A. C.; and Chet Bowman and Jimmy Pappas of the New York A. C.

The Canadian flashed down the straightaway in 4 1/4 seconds to take his best of the 45 yard special Tuesday night and beat Bowman and Al Bates, of Penn State, in the process.

In the final the Canadian showed the way by inches to Wildermuth, Pappas and Bowman in 5 1/10 seconds. Wildermuth had won the second set in 5 1/4 with Pappas second and John Fitzpatrick, another Canadian Olympic star, third.

Pero Nurni, beaten at the mile by Pat Conner in the Millrose games, led the satisfaction of winning the 2,000 meters run and setting the course record in the 900 yard event. Pappas, lacking real opposition, won the 100 in the slow time of 8:38 1/10 with Ole Anderson, a fellow countryman.

PRINTZ WINS \$3000 DOG DERBY AWARD

TRUCKEE, Calif., Feb. 13.—(U.P.)—Consistent performances of two of Irish and Gordon setter dogs, encouraged by Fred Printz of Portland, Ore., who carries mail in Idaho on his dog sled, were rewarded by victory in the \$3,000 prize after the final lap of the Sierra dog derby here today.

Three times Printz's dogs led a field of 11 entrants around the 3 1/2 mile course from here to Tahoe and return to have the exceptionally low time of eight hours, 39 minutes and 17 seconds.

"Scotty" Allen, Alaskan soundgourd and veteran musher of the north country, was second but he required nine hours, nine minutes and 18 seconds to cover the 3 1/2 miles with his team of malamutes, or half an hour longer than Printz.

As Allen neared the finish line he drew in his team and assisted Thula, a German Shepherd, to tie him for second place in the derby with a total elapsed time of nine hours, 33 minutes and 19 seconds. One of Miss Geelan's dogs had collapsed and she was plucking pushing along with the injured animal on her sled when Allen went to her aid.

Allen received a fitting ovation from 15,000 spectators because his gallantry almost cost him the elapsed prize of \$3,000. His total elapsed time was only one minute and 24 seconds better than that of Roy Stover of McCall, Idaho, who won third prize of \$1,000.

Barl Kimball, Cascade, Idaho musher, was fourth with an elapsed time of nine hours, 13 minutes and 31 seconds.
