

TOTAL RAINFALL IN JUNE 3.51 INCHES; HIGHEST ON RECORD

With a total precipitation of 3.51 inches, June, 1929, is recorded as the rainiest June on record at the local weather office, according to Gerard M. Zwickert, weather observer. In 1928 there was 1.8 of an inch of rain in June; in 1927, 1.52 inches; in 1926, .23; in 1925, .87; and in 1924, .36 of an inch, records for the past five years show.

There were 12 clear days, 11 partly cloudy days, and seven cloudy days during the month, the report shows. The prevailing wind for the month was northwest and the mean temperature 60.4.

Although every one thought Sunday's heat was probably the greatest for the month, the maximum reached only 84, according to the weather office. In the report given Monday morning, the Willamette river had dropped to minus 1 of a foot.

The river did not drop below zero during June, the monthly report although it usually does during this time of year. The highest mark for the river during the month was 2.4 feet and the lowest 0. In June, 1928, the river's highest mark was 3 of a foot and the lowest, minus 3; in 1927, 3.8 and 1.1; in 1926, .5 minus 2; in 1925, 4.8 and 1.8; in 1924, 2.1 of the new medicine is being sold.

War on Weeds is On in Lane County

Lane county's war on noxious weeds, and against the Canadian thistle and wild morning glory in particular, is being pushed rapidly toward its conclusion, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

Orders for calcium chlorate and sodium chlorate, the poisons used in combatting the pests, are being received by the county agent daily. The Lane county court has taken 112 pounds of sodium chlorate and 100 pounds of the calcium chlorate but this has already been apportioned for use. Persons wishing to secure the chemicals may place their orders at the office of the county agricultural agent.

Forestry Course At Butte Finished

The short course of the Cascade national forest for the employees of the summer term closed Saturday afternoon, and was pronounced the most successful course in recent years by N. F. Macdougall, supervisor.

More than 60 men took the courses in fire fighting and other courses given to prepare the men for the summer work. Addresses were given on the following subjects:

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HORSES, STEERS READY FOR RODEO

The Lane county fairgrounds were busy as the proverbial beehive Monday morning as final preparations got under way for the big Fourth of July rodeo celebration to be held there under the auspices of the Lane County Fair association, Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

Dove Anderson's bucking horses and steers were being moved into the fairgrounds from pasture, where they have been kept while plans for the rodeo were being shaped. The corral in front of the grandstand is being repaired to hold the untamed animals who are expected to make plenty of trouble for Anderson's cowboys.

Several of the outlaw horses who made whoopee before the stands at the Lane county fair last fall will be ready to perform again at the Fourth of July rodeo. These include Aimee, a bay mare who certainly can kick up her heels. A number of expert broncho and steer riders and setter bulldozers are arriving early this week to take part in the rodeo.

Jim Lawson, official announcer for the Lane county fair, will handle the megaphone at the rodeo. Anderson will be in general charge of the rodeo events, which have been arranged under the direction of Mabel H. Chadwick, secretary of the fair association.

The first rodeo program will be on Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. On Thursday afternoon at the same hour another afternoon program will take place, and on Thursday evening a rodeo program will be interspersed with fireworks and other features. Bicycle races, a dog race, and other features will provide variety for the afternoon program as well.

Steer riding and bulldozing, broncho riding, trick riding and other rodeo features are planned. Particular interest centers in the probable performance of two wild buffaloes, brought here from Yakima by Anderson, which will be ridden in the rodeo arena.

All proceeds from the rodeo will go toward making a bigger and better Lane county fair late in August.

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CLOVER CROP SALE TO BE CONSIDERED AT STATE MEETING

About 25 Lane county clover growers are expected to attend the Oregon state clover seed conference to be held Friday, July 12 at Oregon State college, Corvallis at 10 o'clock in the morning for the purpose of the considering the possibility for the raising of the quarantine now existing in the east on the Oregon clover seed crop, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

A marketing policy for Oregon red clover growers, and local production and handling policies will be undertaken at the conference, according to G. R. Hyslop, agronomist of the State college experiment station.

The Oregon red clover has been

subject of much criticism in eastern markets because eastern buyers allege that it has been infested by a fungus disease that has started to ravage the seed growers and clover stations. Mr. Hyslop said.

New Oregon clover growers have developed a new type of clover that is believed to have overcome the disease. With the planting of the new Oregon variety of clover will come more gain popularity.
