

LUMBER MARKET ON UP TREND; STOCKS ARE BELOW NORMAL

The past 10 days in Eugene have been characterized by better demand in the lumber industry with many leading lumbermen believing that the danger of a serious slump, which was threatened the early part of this month, has passed. This is the report of the June 29 issue of *Crow's Pacific Coast Lumber Digest*.

Report on conditions in the Eugene market is given as follows:

"There has been a very slight increase in the output of the small mills recently as an aftermath of the enforced curtailment which came about as a result of the late rains that held trucks logging down to a minimum and in some instances caused small operations to close entirely. However, to more than offset this increased output, a number of medium sized plants that had added extra shifts have discontinued them and it is questionable if in the aggregate there has been any appreciable change in the daily output.

Heavy Shutdowns
"It now begins to look as though there will be the heaviest and most extended shutdown over the 4th of July that there has been in the Eugene district for several years. Many mills have already announced plans that call for closing on the 20th of June to be idle until the second Monday in July and practically everyone will be down at least three days, many remaining closed until the middle of the month. This prospective curtailment has immediately resulted in a quickening in buying and there are already cases where small premiums have been paid in order to get difficult orders accepted with a definite promise for shipment before the mills have closed for the mid-summer holidays.

"Mill stocks are not excessive and with many concerns are below normal. That is equally true of all desirable items of both common and finished lumber. The mills specializing on long dimension have allowed their production to get away from them with the result that prices on this item have suffered considerably but the output of the plant of this size has been greatly reduced and it is felt that the long dimension market will very quickly regain its balance.

Orders Satisfactory
"Mill orders files are very satisfactory considering the short time they now have left to operate and no one is reaching out for business. The demand from the retail yards throughout the east is still more or less hand-to-mouth and calling for exceptionally quick shipment. Prices on orders of this sort have not lost a great deal of ground and the opinion is generally shared that retail yard orders will again be the 15th of July everything they have lost since the first of May.

"The demand for car material is not quite as heavy as it was but even so there is a very satisfactory footage being placed with the result that prices on anything in the way of special cut cars or difficult items is being met. The most astonishing and gratifying results.

Henry Lohman of New York City, director of the Retail Grocers of America, is a visitor in Eugene and will address a meeting of retail grocers to be held Monday evening, July 8, at 7:30 o'clock in the chamber of commerce rooms. All retail grocers, their wives, their clerks and their wives are invited to the meeting which is being sponsored by the Korn Baking company of this city.

Mr. Lohman is traveling over the United States, having attended the national convention of the Retail Grocers' Association in Portland in June. He will discuss what took place at the convention as well as some of the problems affecting the grocer today. Mr. Lohman is president of the Retail Grocers' Association and also secretary of the National Grocers' Association.

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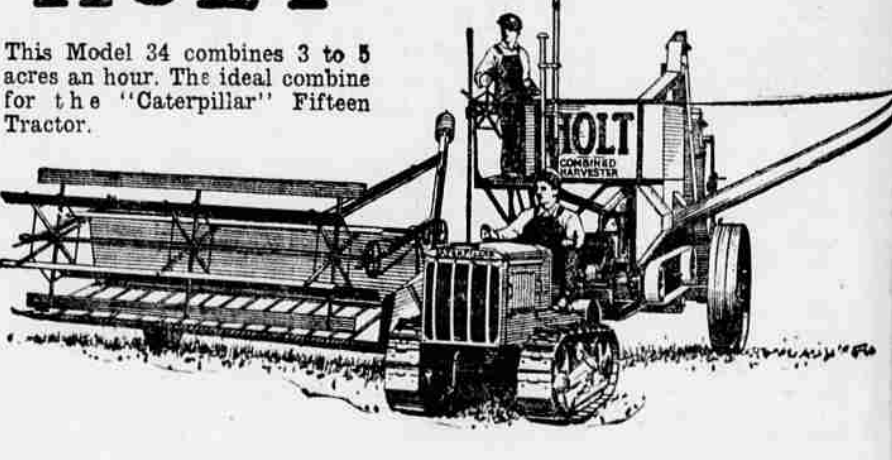
