ACCIDENT VICTIM
DIES IN HOSPITAL

Another death was added to the Fourth of July Accident toll for Lane county Friday evening at 8 o'clock when Fred Venglen, 34, Mantoloking, died in the Pacific Christian hospital. The other fatal accident of Thursday was the drowning of little Jimmy Torgensen, age 3, of Glendale who met his death in the Siuslaw river.

Mr. Venglen, with his wife and daughter Helga, age 7, were driving along the Siuslaw highway between Mantoloking and Florence when the car left the road and plunged 100 feet to the Southern Pacific tracks below. Mr. Venglen's back was broken in two places and he received other injuries. Helga, age 7, was killed. Helga was in the local hospital, the former suffering with internal injuries and the latter with a fractured leg. Attending physicians said that both are holding their own but are in a very serious condition yet.

Deputy Coroner Clarence Simon conducted an investigation of the accident Saturday and said that no request would be held. Mr. Venglen was driving his own car.

Funeral services will be made from the Brannetter chapel. Besides his wife, Mr. Venglen leaves three children: Kenneth, age 5; Helga, age 7; and Mary, age 5. It is said that he has no other close relatives.

Mrs. Chester Kuhl of Glendale, who, with her husband, almost died with a similar accident Thursday on the same highway is still in the local hospital and is reported as slightly improved. She is suffering from a fractured skull and broken vertebra. Mr. Kuhl was released from the hospital Friday morning.

TWO TRAINS TO RUN
TO CRESCENT LAKE

Two trains will run from Eugene to Crescent lake Sunday, one to carry through passengers and the other to do local work. It was announced Friday by L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company, increased interest in the excursion trip was given as the cause for the additional train.

Both trains will leave Eugene at 7 o'clock Sunday morning. The one going straight through to the lake and the other will pick up passengers along the route.

He said that proper business administration of Indian property was impossible under present laws, either by Indians or by business administrators selected by the Indians.

In answer to a question, he said that the incorporation of Indian property and its management under modern business methods would be seriously considered.
