

Yaqui Joe, Barackman, Wrestling Bruin At Armory July 12

WITH WRESTLERS CLEVER AND FAST CROWD PLEASERS

Eugene wrestling fans have their prayers answered. Yaqui Joe, Sonora Indian wrestler who made such a hit with the crowd at the armory the night of June 25 when he threw Wildcat Pete, junior middleweight champion of the world and Eugene's own, for two straight falls, will again appear at the armory on the night of July 12 with Mervin Barackman, midweight wrestler from Seattle and the middle west.

Not only will these two twinkling stars of the wrestling world be on the bill, but Barackman's wrestling partner, "Bully" will make his initial appearance in Eugene. This Bruin is a trained performer and will take on a couple of local boys—it takes two to make him and he keeps them busy. He is billed as the cleverest, most aggressive and scientific wrestling star on the stage today.

Herb Owen, matchmaker for the Eugene boxing and wrestling commission, had a difficult time to hold Yaqui Joe over. Despite the fact that the Sonora Indian-Wildcat Pete drew the largest attending house that the arena ever had it was small compared to the ones Yaqui Joe is used to wrestling before.

From the minute the blanket-wrapped Indian crawls through the ropes and sits cross-legged in his corner the crowd is keyed up and ready to go. The loose-hanging arms of Yaqui Joe swing his head when the time comes to grapple. His flying toe holds it too fast to watch and this hold spelled the first down for Wildcat Pete.

Mervin Barackman has not yet appeared in the squared circle in Eugene but recently at Brownsville he divided two falls with Wildcat Pete.

Joe will weigh around 151 pounds and Barackman will top the scales around 185 at the time of the match.

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PHILS TAKE CARDS WHILE OTHER CLUBS STAY IN IDLENESS

Gulls were apical generally along the baseball front yesterday as the major league armies moved into position for another series of intersectional battles, but the Cardinals found time to lose their teeth straight while waiting for the other teams to swing into action. The champions were accommodated yesterday by nobody but the Phils, who obligingly dropped 20 out of 30 to St. Louis last year.

Jeas Haines made as if to slip a fast one past Charlie Klein, first Philadelphia batsman in the tenth inning, after Master Klein had refused to bite at two wide hooks. The fast one was just to Klein's liking, and he drove it high over the right field wall of Baker bowl to give the Phils a 10 to 0 decision. It was his twentieth home run, and enabled him to keep pace with Chick Hefey of St. Louis, who picked up his own twentieth earlier in the game.

The Cardinals will remain in Philadelphia for a full series, and the Gulls will invade the citadel of the Braves today, but the rest of the intersectional openings will be delayed until tomorrow. The Red Sox, who are the Giants in no way, will come to the Polo grounds for two games on the Sabbath after a farewell brush with Pittsburgh today, and the fast moving Pirates will settle themselves at Ebbets field, Brooklyn will entertain at the Polo grounds today.

As the Pirates and the Gulls give each other heart failure in the dash toward the National league stretch, Cornelius McGillicuddy moves serenely toward his seventh flag with his two nearest rivals, the Yankees and the Browns, nine and one-half games to the rear. The Machmen open a series at Chicago today as the Yankees and the Browns begin a fight to see which shall hold second place for the moment.

The Indians turned back the White Sox by 11 to 10 in a groggy game at Cleveland yesterday prior to the arrival of Boston in Cleveland and at Washington in Detroit for two stirring series. One victory gave the Indians an edge of four games to two in the extended holiday engagement.

Henri Cochet wins British net title.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 6.—(P)—Henri Cochet of France won the British tennis championship today by defeating his countryman, Jean Borotra, in the final match.

Cochet overcame the bounding Borotra to win straight sets by scores of 6-4, 6-3, 6-4.

Cochet who won the title in 1927, captured the crown this year in one of the most impressive displays of tennis ever seen on the courts of Wimbledon. Bill Tilden and Borotra, two of the greatest players of the day, were smothered by him in three straight sets, the American getting but ten games and the Basque but 11.

Little Henri also holds the American championship won last fall.
