APPROACH ON VIDA BRIDGE IS STARTED

A bridge crew of the state highway department left Eugene Monday morning for Vida where work on the approach of the Gate creek bridge on the McKenzie highway was started.

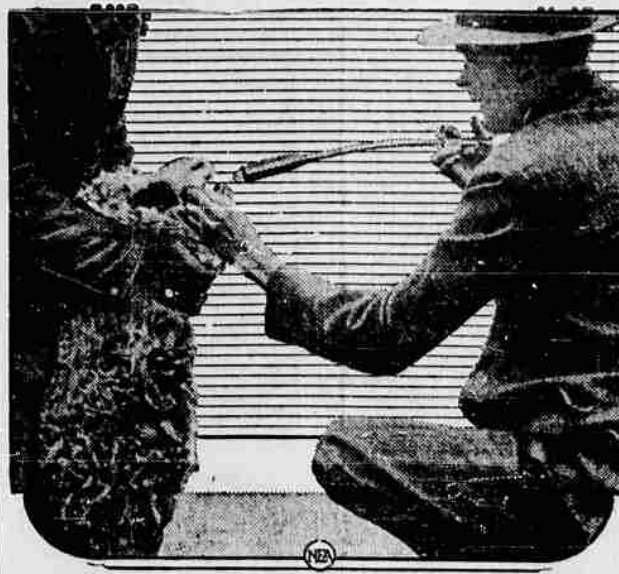
The new Gate creek bridge has four spans, the bridge proper being 150 feet long, and the bridge with the approaches approximating 3000 feet. The structure is made of concrete.

The bridge proper is practically completed, the sidewalk and the side-rail yet having to be completed. H. W. Libby, superintendent of construction of the highway department, said.

The state highway department's program on the McKenzie highway includes also a new bridge over the McKenzie river at McKenzie bridge. Work on this bridge has not progressed so rapidly. The Gate creek will be completed first, Mr. Libby said, and then crews will start immediately on the McKenzie bridge.

The McKenzie bridge will be a concrete structure with steel superstructure encased in concrete, and that the approaches will be about 4000 feet long.

bar of commerce, taking off again at 10:22.

From Albany to Corvallis took 11 minutes, landing at 10:33, to take off once more at 10:44 and arriving in Eugene at 11:04.

After leaving Eugene at 1 o'clock, the plane was scheduled to make stops at Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford and Klamath Falls, with an over-night stop at the latter place. After spending the night at Baker, a short stop will be made at Hood River on the return to Portland, which the fliers expect to reach Wednesday afternoon.

The monoplane is built with a cabin for four passengers and the pilot and powered with a 225 horsepower Wright whirling motor. The cruising speed is about 110 miles an hour, with a top speed of 125 miles.

EUGENE TUNES IN ON LONDON, ENGLAND

Several Eugeneans who were at their radios between 2 and 3 a. m. Sunday were rewarded by hearing loyal subjects of King George of England in a thanksgiving service in Westminster Abbey in London, England, broadcast across an ocean and a continent. The service celebrated the king's recovery from his recent serious illness.

The international network carried the service to the four corners of the globe, and the "God Save the King," voiced by the dean of Canterbury, rang out clearly in Eugene. Portland radio station KGW was linked with the network and many of those heard the music and speaking of the service from this station.

WHEELER LAW IS RETAINED BY LANE

The Lane county boundary board decided to stand by the means of financing high school education in the second class districts at present, at a meeting Monday morning.

After delegations from Cottage Grove, Springfield, ad Junction City had asked that a change be made to the high school tuition fund law, and representatives of the smaller districts demanded the continuation of the Wheeler law, the matter was put to vote.

Commissioner Oral E. Crowe moved that the Wheeler method be retained, the motion was seconded by Clinton Hurd, commissioner, and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

About 50 educators of the county were present at the meeting.

The Wheeler law provides a blanket tax on the assessed valuation of the county. In Lane county this is a 1.74 mills tax which provides a fund amounting to \$93,000. The high school tuition law provided that the county should pay the balance of the cost.
